Grappling Nothing But Horseplay; Matmen Told To Wrestle Or Get Out

Chicago, Jan. 5 (AP)—No more roughhouse or burlesque wrestling goes in Chicago.

No longer will the big, hairy chested, mammoths of the mat be allowed to toss each other out of the ring, exchange bites, slug each other, and indulge in other monkey business in the huge delight of the spectators.

In the future wrestlers must wrestle, or be fined, suspended, or both.

General John V. Clinin, chairman of the Illinois State Athletic commission made known his stand today after one of the wrestling boys, Lou Plummer, of South Bend, Ind., took a few wallops at the referee in a recent match. Plummer was ordered to appear before the commission next Monday for discipline.

General Clinin said that present wrestling was nothing more than "horse play"; that they were not contests, and nothing more than exhibitions of tossing each other around—a burlesque on the Roman arena.

"I am sick and tired of this monkey business," General Clinin said. "Wrestlers must wrestle or get out. These fellows go through the same act all over the country. In some places the referees are part of the act, but in Illinois, they are representatives of the state, and must uphold the dignity."

"These exhibitions are not even amusement; they don't approach it. These wrestlers either go to a draw for a stipulated number of minutes, or one of them lays down, according to an arranged program. It is no longer a sport. They bite each other, trade blows, and go through other horseplay for no other purpose than to work on the passion of the spectators. They are fooling the people by claiming to put on a contest where there is no contest to it."

Members of the athletic board felt certain that definite action would be taken at tonight's meeting. ORANGEMEN AND COUGARS START COURT SEASON

Seattle, Jan. 5 (AP)—One of the closest basketball races in the history of the northern division Pacific Coast conference is looked for this season when two potential champions start the 40-game schedule at Pullman, Wash., tomorrow night.

Washington State college will entertain Oregon State with two games this week-end to rule the curtain on the 1933 maple court stage, and Idaho, Oregon and Washington will follow with performances the following week.

Washington will seek its sixth consecutive northern division title this season. The Huskies won the crown last year in a hair-raising finish, conquering Washington State in the last two games of the schedule to nose out the Cougars by one victory.

Oregon State and Washington State are figured on paper to be exceptionally strong this year and a three-cornered race is expected between the two schools and Washington.

Coaches Jack Priel of W.S.C., Slats Gill of O.S.C., and Hec Edmundson of Washington all report stronger lineups this season. They admit they have a chance to win the championship but respect the strength and ability of their opponents.

SHRINE CONTEST GREAT, GRANNIS

"The best game of football I have ever seen," was the description given by the East-West contest Monday in Klamath stadium, San Francisco, by Loren Grannis, Willamette university center who was one of the thousands of spectators witnessing the struggle. Grannis spent the Christmas holiday period in the bay district, visiting with a sister. He returned to Salem Tuesday evening.

Despite the fact members of both teams in many instances had never seen each other until a week or ten days before the game, there was little ragged playing. Grannis said, Bill Morgan, University of Oregon tackle, came in for a lot of praise from Grannis. "They shot a lot of plays at Morgan, but I failed to see much yardage made over his position," he added.

Although he was not entirely sure Grannis expressed the opinion that holding in the line was probably the cause of the fistic battle between Kurth and Stone, Kurth, an all-American from Notre Dame, was heartily ashamed of his action after he had had opportunity to cool off. Early in the game the East's ends were getting down under the punts in remarkable fashion, stated Grannis. Later on in the game, the West's starting holding and it was due to a large extent to such tactics that Schalch was unable to return two punts for his gains.

Being a linesman himself, and a good one at that, Grannis was naturally interested in the performance of the forward walls. He said the West's superiority in the department was largely responsible for the East's defeat.
