Installation of officers for the Woodmen of the World will be held at the Fraternal temple building Friday evening at 8 o'clock.

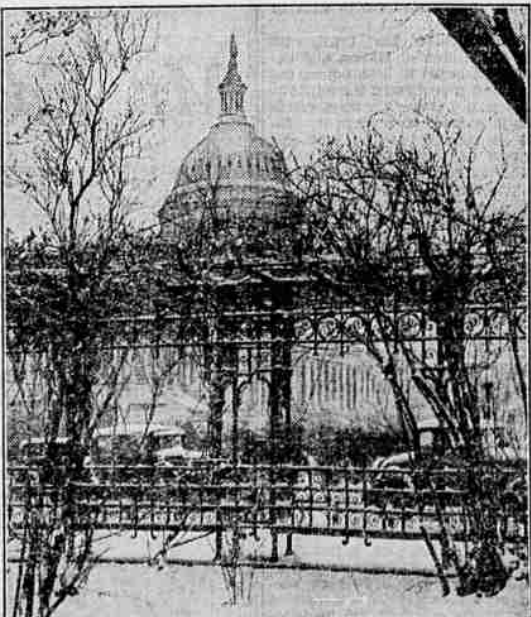

CHINESE DEMAND JAP WITHDRAWAL

London, Jan. 6 (UP)—China has protested to the Japanese foreign office against occupation of Shantung, demanding immediate withdrawal of Japanese troops from Chinese territory, the Chinese legation announced today.

Prevention of similar incidents in the future, reparations for damages, and punishment of Japanese officers responsible for the invasion, also was demanded.

The Chinese government charged that the attack on Shantung was calculated to aggravate the situation in Manchuria, contrary to Japan's promises to the League of Nations.

ACTRESS KNEW JEWEL ROBBERS

Hollywood, Cal., Jan. 6 (UP)—In a sealed police report opened today it was disclosed that Betty Compson, film actress, who said she was held up in her home last night and robbed of jewels which she valued at \$41,500, was aware of the identity of the robber.

The actress, the report said, was afraid to name the intruder because he might "take her for a ride."

Police said they had summoned her and E. D. Leshin, who was in her home during the holdup, to headquarters again for a second questioning.

The report disclosed that Miss Compson, former wife of James Cruze, director, first said the man appeared at her home disguised in the uniform of a messenger and appeared to be 35 years of age.

Later, the officers said, her story was that of the man was attired in a black overcoat and gray slouch hat, and appeared to be 26 years old.

"Miss Compson and Mr. Leshin," the report continued, "had been drinking. Miss Compson requested we call Irving Winberg, whom she called her sweetheart, and request that he come over and she would tell the whole story."

"After Winberg arrived, she gave no more information. Mr. Winberg stated he would stay there and get the true story of what actually happened, if anything."

KING OPPOSED TO NEW TAX PROPOSAL

Washington, Jan. 6 (UP)—Criticism of the proposal for increased taxes which emerged from the democratic conference in New York early today, Senator King, Utah democrat, said increased taxation at this time would demonstrate "lack of statesmanship and courage" by his party.

Senator King said that instead of raising taxes, the democrats should "cut 25 per cent, or \$1,900,000,000 from federal expenditures."

"The looks like congress hasn't the courage to cut expenses," he said. "I'm afraid the democrats haven't the courage to carry out their campaign pledge."

PLAN DANCES FOR FINANCING POLICE RADIO

Almost unanimous approval of Chief of Police Minto's proposal to sponsor one or two public dances for the purpose of raising funds with which to equip the city police department with a radio transmitting set and receivers for the patrol cars has convinced the chief of the feasibility of the plan. As a result he has made up his mind to go ahead with the project. Although the cost of the entire project would be short of \$1000, the city has no fund which could be utilized.

In pointing out the desirability of radio equipment, the chief said the system of lights used at present to attract the attention of traffic officers resulted in quite a bit of delay. The only way the night desk man has of getting in touch with patrol cars is to switch on the red lights. Since few telephones are available to officers late at night, they find it necessary to drive to the police department to find out what is wanted. In one instance, the officers wanted drove past the building which was reported as being robbed.

With radio equipment on all cars, Chief Minto points out, drivers could keep in touch with headquarters at all times. It would also permit the use of an additional man to check traffic in the daytime. At present it is found necessary to keep a traffic officer at headquarters almost continuously to take care of emergency calls.

A few years ago the police and fire departments gave two or three benefit dances. More than a thousand dollars were raised, the money being used to equip a gymnasium.

Summed before the ways and means committee last night Henry Hansen, budget director, told the committee members that the administration would go right down the line with them in any economy that might desire to effect, but that the budget estimates for the state institutions administered by the board of control have been cut to the very bone and that opposition can be expected to any proposal to impair the state's care of its wards.

From this it can be judged that the committee's proposal to reduce salaries up to 40 per cent is going to meet with the displeasure and determined opposition of Governor Meier, in that application of some of the salary cuts would reduce compensation of some of the institution heads and trained staffs to a point that would make it impossible to keep experienced and competent officials on their jobs.

The salary reduction would, for instance, cut the pay of such an official as Dr. R. E. L. Stelzer, superintendent of the state hospital, and a nationally recognized institution administrator, to about \$225 a month. The pay of the superintendent of the prison, also recognized for his proven efficiency, would be cut to less than \$200 a month, and so on down through a long list of similar cases.

The ways and means committee also failed to take into consideration the fact that some salary reductions for all employees are already included in the budget, and that the saving they propose to accomplish would not nearly approximate the figure they expected.

There will also be some reversals in judgment when the ways and means committee gets into its real study of the budget and state finances and finds that the funds of most of the self-supporting departments it would tap for revenue are depleted or already overdrawn, and that the collections of these departments have failed off materially.

It is also probable that the legislature when it gets down to the actual job of doing it will trim any great amount off the appropriations for the institutions of higher learning, that is, not in proportion to the amounts they are talking about. More light on this phase of the matter will be contained when the committee gets ready to report Saturday.

Today a sub-committee was delving into the matter. During the morning C. L. Starr, chairman of the board of higher education, appeared before them and this afternoon President W. J. Kerr was to be quizzed.

DEPORTATION OF GERGUSON ORDERED

New York, Jan. 6 (UP)—Harry F. Gerguson, whose escapades as "Prince Michael Romanoff" frequently have brought him into clashes with immigration authorities, was ordered excluded from the United States today.

A special board of inquiry issued the order after a hearing at Ellis Island.

Immigration Commissioner Edward T. Connelley announced a department of labor representative had ordered Gerguson's release on \$2500 bail pending an appeal to the department of labor.

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KIDNAPING THREATS AGAINST DOLLAR

San Rafael, Cal., Jan. 6 (UP)—Reports that the Robert Dollar mansion here has been guarded for the past 72 hours because of extortionist threats led to the disclosure today that private detectives and police have attempted to trap the plotters here and in San Francisco.

Notes have been received by Mrs. Robert Dollar, widow of the late shipping magnate, demanding money. They included threats of death if kidnapping of her four grandchildren if she did not pay.

One suspect was arrested after a woman, disguised as Mrs. Dollar, left a package of bogus money at a point designated by the extortionists. Hours of rigorous questioning failed to connect the suspect with the incident, police said. Grounds of the Dollar mansion are brilliantly lit up at night, and private detectives are on guard.

Washington, Jan. 6 (UP)—A bill designed to make "seven significant changes in the emergency relief act and quicken the flow of funds for the relief of the needy will be introduced Monday by Senator Wagner, democrat, New York, he said today.

NEW WILLYS MODELS PUT ON MARKET

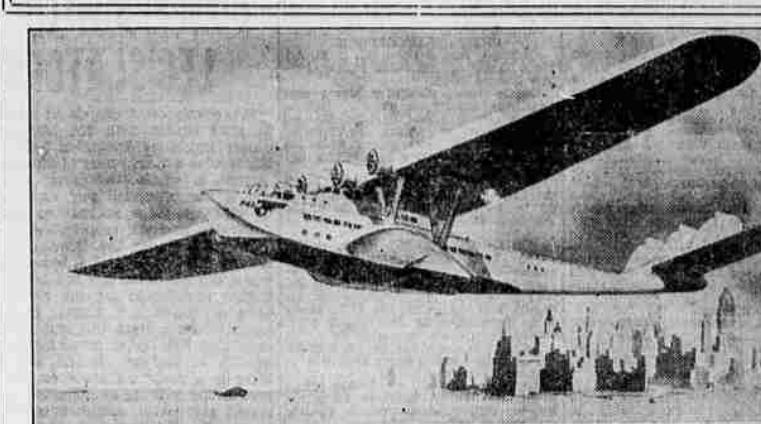
Toledo, Ohio, Jan. 6 — With a price range of \$395 to \$475, the new 1933 Willys 77 was announced today.

SALARY CUTS IMPAIRS STATE CARE OF WARDS

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BOMBING TALE DISCREDITED BY SECRET SERVICE

Kansas City, Mo., Jan. 6 (UP)—Federal investigators here today said they were without information on a reported inquiry into the possibility that a bomb caused the plane crash in which Knute Rockne and seven other men were killed.

R. E. Vetterli, agent in charge of the local bureau of investigation, and W. H. Davenport, head of the Kansas City secret service bureau, joined in denying knowledge of the reported inquiry.

Leonard Jurden, investigating for the department of commerce, said he believed it very improbable that the crash was caused by explosion of a bomb.

Jurden conducted the investigation for the department of aeronautics after the crash.

G. E. Everett, general agent for the Transcontinental and Western Air lines also disclaimed any knowledge of the inquiry. He said it was possible that a bomb could have caused the accident, but that he had no information leading him to believe that such was the case.

Jurden said that his investigation indicated that there was so much gasoline in the tanks of the ship at the time of the crash that almost any explosion would have been sure to cause it to catch fire.

The ship did not burn. He also said that the ship had wings which could not be entered by anyone seeking to place a bomb without leaving traces which would be easy to detect in the inspections made before every flight.

Every occupant of the big trimotor plane was instantly killed when it crashed to earth in a meadow near Bazaar, Kans., on the gray afternoon of March 31, 1931.

It generally was believed that bad weather was in some way a factor in the crash. Some thought the big ship might have been struck by lightning.

The ship was flying through clouds at the time of its fatal plunge. Warnings of bad weather had been given the pilot by radio, and his co-pilot had reported back to the ground crew at the Wichita airport only a few moments before the accident that:

"It's getting tough up here. I think maybe we'll turn around and go back to Kansas City."

Representative Lowell Paget of Portland today introduced a bill in the house calling for the repeal of the three-mill levy on real property. Representatives signing the bill with Paget include Speaker Earl W. Snell, F. Allen of Wallawa and Harvey Wells of Portland.

The bill, probably one of the shortest to be introduced, in full provides that the "general real and property tax for state purposes for the year 1933 in the sum of \$2,975,837 levied and apportioned by the state tax commission on December 30, 1932, under the provisions of section 69-432, Oregon Code 1930, is hereby abated, repealed and annulled."

The certificate issued by the state tax commission thereunder, together with the transcript of said tax levy and apportionment remitted to the various counties under section
