NUDITY BREAKS BARRIER DOWN FOR LONDONERS

London (AP)—Nudity, always shunned by London's famous theaters in the past, finally has stormed and captured this last stronghold of stage decorum.

Sedate playhouses of the West End, places which cradled the tradition of Shaw, Barrie, Pinero and Lonsdale, suddenly have gone in for nudity with all the zeal of a person's son sowing his first wild oats.

Throughout the post-war years when all barriers were falling away, when the Folies Bergere was reaping a golden harvest from tourists in Paris, when American burlesque was enjoying a gaudy renaissance, London's theater-goers remained true to the legitimate drama. They prided themselves that the "new freedom" had not played havoc with their standards of good taste.

Last summer the standards began to totter when London was struck by the new non-stop variety craze. Now half of the third-rate theaters are filled with third-rate vaudeville, featuring not only a generous offering of nudity on the stage, but semi-nude usherettes and program sellers as well.

Musical hall comedians who never dreamed of appearing anywhere but Soho or the East End are retelling their double entendre wisecracks in houses formerly devoted to Shakespeare and Ibsen.

Theatrical associations recently have received many complaints from employers, such as the usherettes, who have gone down with influenza, severe colds and pneumonia while working in scanty costumes. They have to stand in drafty passages and serve drinks in the refreshment lounges, which often are dangerously chilly.

The Lord Chamberlain, who censors legitimate plays, has been appealed to, but he cannot stop the shows. Only the police can step in, either to close the show or warn the manager that his license will not be renewed.

London still claims dictatorial authority in the matter of men's fashions, but this season no new decrees are going forth.

Because of the times, rich and poor men alike are wearing tight last year's clothes. Tailors have taken the common-sense attitude that it is not the right time to launch new styles.

Overcoats show the most noticeable changes, although the double-breasted Chesterfield dark blue or gray is the great favorite. Most of this year's models are belted in the back. For those who can afford new coats, a roomy, full-belted Ulster with wide collar and sporty lines is the latest thing.

ROAD INTERESTS OPPOSING LOANS

Washington, Jan. 7 (AP)—Paul V. Betters, executive director of the American Municipal Association, Chicago, asserted in a senate hearing today that pressure has been brought to bear by highway interests to prevent some states from applying for unemployment loans from the Reconstruction corporation.

Without naming them, he said he knew of three states where "road interests" have "decided on the governor" to induce him not to seek a loan. This was done, he said, on the theory that since the loans are to be repaid out of future federal aid highway funds, it was thought there would be fewer rural roads built after 1935 if the advances were received.

COUSINS MURDER TRIAL OPENS MONDAY

Vancouver, Wash., Jan. 7 (AP)—Jesse Cousins, 46, farmer in the hill district near here, will go on trial in superior court Monday for the murder of Edward Vlasich of Tacoma, one of two federal prohibition officers who were fatally wounded when they attempted to raid the Cousins farm.

Cousins was charged with first degree murder in connection with the killing of Vlasich and Ballard Turner, the other officer, but will be tried first for the Vlasich slaying.

The evidence against him is circumstantial. He disappeared after the shooting and was captured a month or so later in the hills near his home.

Above the regular dial is a semi-circular dial.

HELTZEL ESTATE PUT AT \$80,041

The estate of the late James G. Heltsel, Salem attorney, who mysteriously disappeared from a Pacific liner while at sea has been appraised at \$80,041.04, with property in three Oregon counties. The appraisal for Marion county was made by W. J. Linfoot, Roy Burton and Bert Ford.

The various schedules show real property in Marion county valued at \$32,555.89, realty in Yamhill county, \$800, and realty in Clackamas county, \$3354.66. Cash notes and mortgages total an appraised valuation of \$27,724.98; stocks and bonds are listed at \$11,333.50 and office equipment, library, and accounts receivable at \$3451.10.

Of the real property 29 parcels are listed as being situated in Marion county, one in Yamhill and one in Clackamas. Except some holdings in Commonwealth Power, all of the stocks and bonds are held in Oregon securities. Notes are virtually all secured by mortgages on Oregon real estate. Under the real estate schedule while it is shown that there are outstanding mortgages against some of the properties owned by the estate, the listing is the net value over and above the mortgages as estimated by the appraisers.

GREYHOUND BUSES REPORT A PROFIT

San Francisco, Jan. 7 (AP)—The Pacific Greyhound Corporation, operating passenger buses from Portland, Ore., to El Paso, Texas, and from San Francisco to Salt Lake City, today reported a profit of \$408,547 for the 11 months ending November 30, 1932.

Figures released by President T. B. Wilson revealed the company's income, operating and otherwise, for the 11-month period total \$4,737,149, a decrease of \$1,848,382 as compared with the same period in 1931. All expenses amounted to \$4,328,592, a decrease of \$1,586,117.

A decrease of \$1,529,412 in total operating income in 1932 as compared with 1931 was reported and a corresponding decrease of \$1,586,117 in operating expenses.

The company reported carrying 3,079,162 revenue passengers in the 11-month period of 1932 against 4,826,300 for 1931.

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FIRE DAMAGES CATHOLIC U.

Washington, Jan. 7 (AP)—An unestimated amount of damage was done to the administration building of Catholic university before a fire which broke out into the early-morning quietude of the campus today was extinguished by fire-fighting apparatus responding to a multiple-alarm.

Justin Harrison, about 48 years old, was held on investigation charges after his arrest when a night watchman, turning in the second fire alarm, found him loitering in the hallway of a nearby dormitory. Pending questioning of the man and further investigation of the third-story hallway and partitions where the blaze broke out, no explanation of the fire's origin was advanced.

Although the fire apparently originated in the flooring of the third-story corridor separating laboratories and other departmental rooms of McMahon hall, was put under control before it had spread to a great extent, it was believed by university officials that the damage would be considerable. Many volumes of books were damaged by fire and water, but valuable laboratory equipment and other furnishings were removed to vaults in the basement.

STIMSON TO MEET ROOSEVELT MONDAY

Aboard Presidential Special, Enroute to Washington, Jan. 7 (AP)—Secretary Stimson said today he would meet with President-elect Roosevelt on Monday to discuss at the latter's request continuing international problems now confronting the state department.

The secretary of state left the presidential train at New York and traveled to his own Long Island home for the week-end before meeting the president-elect at Hyde Park.

The White House announced Thursday that Mr. Roosevelt had requested a conference with Stimson upon state department matters, but that the date of the meeting had been left to the convenience of the president-elect. There had been rumors, but no definite confirmation from the administration that the secretary of state would not return to Washington after attending funeral services for Calvin Coolidge at Northampton, Mass., but would go directly to the conference.

WELCH TO SERVE TWO LIFE TERMS

Hillsboro, Ore., Jan. 7 (AP)—Two life sentences, to run consecutively, were imposed on Aubrey Welch, 39, in circuit court here Friday for the slaying of his wife and their 8-year-old daughter at Tigard Dec. 26. Welch pleaded guilty to two separate charges of second degree murder. A life term was imposed in each case.

He said that after drinking whiskey, beer and wine at a friend's place in Portland, he went home and his wife upbraided him for his use of liquor. He grabbed a paring knife and slashed her throat. The child fled, screaming. He caught her and dashed the blade into her heart.

He then staggered to the home of a neighbor where he rambled, he had "committed a terrible deed."

BOMB EXPLODES IN LARGE INDIAN MOSQUE

New Delhi, India, Jan. 7 (AP)—A bomb exploded today in the Juma Masjid Mosque, largest in northern India.

Two men, one of whom tripped over the bomb in the rear of the famous mosque, were injured in the explosion. Two other bombs were found in the vicinity, causing a hurried exodus of shoppers and shopkeepers.

DEFICIT IN SCHOOLS

Portland, Jan. 7 (AP)—The Portland school district ended 1932 with a deficit of more than \$413,000. Although the \$1,200,000 special school tax levy was defeated last June, the board, through drastic expense reduction, confined the deficit to only \$25,000 more than the deficit at the end of 1931.

MINERS EXEMPTION

Washington, Jan. 7 (AP)—A bill by Senator Borah, republican, Idaho, to exempt unpatented mining claims from the requirement that their claimants must do \$100 worth of work on them each year was approved today by the senate mines committee.

CHAMBER LISTS 14 PROJECTS IN 1932 RECORD

Fourteen different endeavors of the chamber of commerce are given in the weekly bulletin showing the accomplishments of the organization during the past year.

The chamber of commerce inaugurated a movement for setting aside a primitive area south of Mt. Jefferson; assisted in the retention of the Willamette university law school; cooperated in having a bad check ordinance passed by the city council; brought 28 conventions to the city; helped put over the work promotion plan when \$165,000 worth of spring work was obtained; met with war department officials and furnished information for deepening the Willamette river north; worked with the fox breeders with the result that the first fox pelt display and sale will be an annual event; gave 26 rural programs for community clubs; in conjunction with the Salem Business Men's league, refused to endorse outside magazine solicitors and various advertising schemes; started a movement looking for a municipal dock; cooperated with the Women's Greater Oregon association for an industrial display at the armory; helped with the state fair publicity, spending delegations to surrounding cities; extended the courtesy of the chamber of commerce rooms to more than 10,000 persons, with 124 meetings held for farmers and farmer organizations and attended by 4000 persons and handled publicity for the district being the only organization in the city equipped to handle both city and county publicity.

MEIER APPOINTS MEMBERS OF BOARDS

Governor Julius L. Meier announced appointments to five state boards and commissions today.

Charles T. Early was named to succeed himself as a member of the industrial accident commission, for a term ending in January, 1937.

Dr. Joseph P. Wood of Portland was appointed to fill the vacancy on the state board of medical examiners caused by the death of Dr. C. J. McCusker, the term ending February 28, 1939.

Mrs. H. J. Corbett, Mrs. William Kleiter and Estes Snedcor, all of Portland, were reappointed as members of the child welfare commission.

Harry M. Kenin was reappointed on the state welfare commission and H. R. Kreitzer was reappointed as a member of the board of vocational education.

TRUCK GROWERS SEEK SUPERVISION

Charges that truck and vegetable peddlers indiscriminately operating and dumping their products with no regulation or plan of distribution whatever have broken the backbone of the vegetable market and virtually destroyed the industry, were raised at a meeting of vegetable growers at the state department of agriculture today. As a result a bill was discussed for placing such peddling under state supervision, granted the power to the state to issue licenses and establish a general regulatory system for the industry.

The growers here today, over 50 in number, also took preliminary steps to forming a statewide organization to take steps to protect the industry and attempt to put it back on its feet. Growers were here from Roseburg and Portland, with Clackamas county well represented and Grand Island also having nearly a full representation.

Members of the state grange executive committee attended the meeting and all gave short talks in regard to organization.
