

TAX BILL VETO DISPLEASING TO FOUR SECTIONS

Condemning Governor Meler for his veto of the three mill property tax bill and the house of representatives for sustaining the veto, a statement issued by Ray W. Gill, master of the Oregon State Grange, Ben T. Osborne, secretary of the Oregon State Federation of Labor, L.H. McBee, president of the Oregon Farmers union, and T. J. Carson, chairman of the legislative board of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, charges that the action of the governor and legislature was to pave the way for enactment of a sales tax, declares the opposition of those organizations to such a tax and advocates income, inheritance and gift taxes.

The statement asserts that action on the property tax repeal veto was "hurried through, entirely disregarding several members who wanted more time for considering the whole question of financing. The administration attempted to force a sales tax in the special session. In fact, it is very apparent that the sales tax program was the real reason for the special session. The house or senate could have waited several days without taking action on the governor's veto. In fact, those members of the legislature who believe in a sales tax could have waited until the ways and means committee had gone thoroughly into the budget before forcing action on the veto.

"We consider that this action in retaining the three-mill levy is done to pave the way for a sales tax bill, and it is the leverage by which they hope to force the people to accept an obnoxious tax. The responsibility for retaining the three-mill levy on property now rests squarely on the shoulders of the governor who vetoed the repeal bill, and upon those members of the house who voted to sustain the governor's veto. The governor has now demonstrated his determination to pass a sales tax bill. He cannot deny or escape the responsibility.

"All over Oregon there is a rising tide of sentiment against the sales tax bill, once its provisions have become better understood. The responsibility is also now resting upon the ways and means committee of both houses to make substantial reductions in the cost of state government.

"If additional revenues are necessary they should be derived from improved income and inheritance taxes with the addition of a gift tax law. We believe that additional state revenue should come from this type of taxes and should be levied upon those who are able to pay. We will oppose a sales tax to the last in the interest of the general prosperity of Oregon."

MILK BOTTLES OF GRASS GREEN GET PROTECTION

Washington, Jan. 13. (AP)—Luscious grass green, delicately striped with black, may be the accepted color scheme for the milk bottle of day after tomorrow.

The reason for the green is a mere matter of \$1,000,000—the nation's present annual bill for damage to food by rancidity. The color of luscious grass green was officially credited today by the department of agriculture with being the most satisfactory resistant to food spoilage.

The announcement was based on the findings of Mayne B. Coe, a young chemist, who, equipped with a spectrum, a thick notebook and a score of diverse colored vials in which foods were exposed to the sun, ascertained the virtues of green. Black is as good, and is suggested to relieve the monotony in coloring.

There will be no exclusive use of this novel discovery as a public patent has been obtained to make use of color protection available without charge to any resident of the country.

Coe reported that food exposed in clear glass containers spoiled most quickly and that yellowish or bluish green fails to protect.

The green must be of the chlorophyll hue, scientifically described as the portion of the spectrum lying between 4,900 and 5,600 angstrom units.

The established protection applies to oil-bearing foods, but Coe is continuing experimentation to ascertain if other colors will guard the sweetness and purity of non-oil bearing foods.

The green protective principle applies to butter, salad oil, lard, pecans, cashew nuts, potato chips, mayonnaise, whole wheat flour, corn meal, many bakery products and foods containing some quantity of oil.

ALBANY HAS CASH TREASURER SHOWS

Albany—Albany's net indebtedness is \$158,204.61, according to the report of the city recorder. The total indebtedness is \$231,017.28 against which are assets in paying sewer and sidewalk assessments. Cash on hand is \$28,228.64.

The indebtedness consists of \$21,375.38 in outstanding bonds, and \$17,841.90 outstanding warrants.

Distance Equal Of 210 Trips To Moon

Kansas City, Mo. (AP)—United Air Lines pilots have flown on company planes a distance of 50,000,000 miles—equivalent to 210 trips to the moon and 3,334 round the world flights.

Approximately half the distance constituted "night flying," and during the establishment of the record mileage subsidiary companies of the air lines have carried 10,000 tons of air express and approximately 275,000 passengers.
