Silverton Folk Observe Anniversary

Silverton—The bride was dainty little Miss Marcia J. Weaver, daughter of Ann Eliza and Oliver Gardner Weaver. She was gowned in pale blue silk with hoop-skirts and filmy lace accessories. The wedding was a quiet affair at the home of her parents. Miss Marcia was married to her tall soldier lover, wounded and home on a furlough. He was Marcus L. Latham, II, son of Marcus L. and Sarah Latham. There was no winter weather in the little Ohio town of Troy on that 15th day of January, 1864. All was golden sunshine and has continued so throughout the short 69 years of happiness for Marcus and Martha Latham.

Today, Marcia, 61 years old, is the capable, happy mistress of their own apartment. Their home is in conjunction with the large Mill street residence of their son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. H. B. Latham. Marcus is also 61 years old, just four months older than his wife.

They read extensively, and thoroughly enjoy modern poetry. Their votes were cast at the November election, making the 18th presidential vote cast by Mr. Latham, who takes a keen interest in politics.

Mrs. Latham was born in Clearfield, Pennsylvania, December 26, 1841, and at the age of eight, moved with the family to Troy, Ohio. Mr. Latham was born at Troy, August 11, 1841. He served three years with the 41st Ohio Infantry volunteers, and after recovering from wounds, re-enlisted with the 18th Ohio volunteers in 1865, serving for seven months.

At the close of the war they made their home in Ohio for several years, later living in Kansas, Nebraska, Idaho, California and for the past six years, have made their home in Silverton. Each is the last member, living, of the immediate families, and no one is surviving who attended their wedding.

Marcus L. is a favored name of the Latham family. They have a son, Marcus L. III, and Marcus L. IV, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. H. B. Latham, who has a two-year-old son, Marcus L. V.

Friday will be celebrated in a family dinner at the H. B. Latham home with the complimented couple, a grand daughter, Miss Louise Latham, Silverton, and Foster Cone and their small son, Latham, of Portland, and Mr. and Mrs. H. B. Latham, present. Friends will call informally during the day.

Mrs. James Goble, a daughter, living in Los Angeles, has very recently been a guest at her parents, as has their son, Marcus L. of Oakland, California. They will neither one return for the anniversary affair. Mrs. Goble has a son, Latham, of Seattle.

Mr. Latham is the last surviving Civil War veteran in Silverton. The Lathams were Salem residents for a number of years previous to their living in California.
