

NIGHT POLICE WILL BE KEPT AT SILVERTON

Silverton—Mayor E. W. Garver called a special meeting of the city council Monday night to consider the report of the finance committee working in conjunction with J. P. Conrad, head of the street committee. Detailed discussion of the committee's submitted report was indulged in, with ex-mayor Eastman being asked to advise upon the number of men retained on the police force during his term.

A number of recommendations concerning the reduction of the force to two men instead of three was not included in the final adoption of the report, as the safety of the night patrol was at stake should only one man be retained for night duty. As the night men now work five hours, from 11 to 4 o'clock the time of the night men overlap. Statistics show that 85 percent of petty thievery has been eliminated since two night men and the patrol car were in use. On the other hand the reports showed that only 70 percent of the tax funds had been paid in for last year, and indications were that around 60 percent would be in this year.

In what seemed the only feasible way out of the demand for reduction, the report of the committee was adopted that recommended a 15 percent reduction of the salaries of the street workers and of the police officers.

Other matters of lesser importance included a request from the League of Oregon Cities for an extra assessment of \$25 besides the regular dues be levied for paying of legislative lobbying; that A. Heater and John J. Rudd each be granted a license to carry on their business, and that Brown, the former owner of the Oak street pool hall now owned by Rudd, be allowed to cancel his license covering the same period of time as that of Rudd; that the building committee's work be classed under that of health, fire and water; and that the street committee investigate the condition of Loder street over West hill, and report recommendations for improvement at the next regular session of the council.

The library is owned by the city which pays for its upkeep. During the 1932 season the council added an increase of \$100 to the library budget. The library makes its home in the city hall, second floor, and is open Saturday afternoons and Tuesday evenings. Mrs. Dora Shortridge has been librarian for a long time.
