

SALEM, EUGENE RENEW HOSTILITIES TONIGHT

VETERAN CREW OF HOOPSTERS SCENT VICTORY

Eugene high, with virtually the same team which gave Coach Huntington's crew two interesting evenings last year, will endeavor to make a clean sweep over Salem, one of its strongest rivals, tonight.

Having defeated Salem high for two successive years on the gridiron, the purple and white squad feel they might as well make a good job of it and take the long end of the score in basketball competition.

Last season Salem managed to eke out two wins over their upstate rivals, 23 to 18 at Eugene and 17 to 15 on the home floor. Both encounters were thrillers from the start, the one here being especially exciting. During the Salem game, Coach Huntington's men were leading 12 to 11 at half time. Close checking resulted in neither side adding to its score during the entire third period. The final quarter found Salem scoring two field goals and a free shot to one field goal and two free throws for Eugene.

Salem will be strengthened tonight through the return of Phil Brownell.

A preliminary starting at 7 o'clock will feature the "B" team and a squad composed of faculty members of Salem schools.

SANTIAM SPORTS ASK SHAK-UP

Albany—Sportsmen of the Santiam Fish and Game Protective association want a game law change, demanding that administration of game affairs be taken from the state police and vested in a game law enforcing department set up by the Oregon State Game commission and placed under direct supervision of the game organization here this week-end.

Other objectives are: Abolishment of the state game commission and appointment by the state board of control of a state game supervisor with jurisdiction over the propaganda of fish and game and enforcement of the game law.

Removal of paid attorney, research director of the game department and retention of educational director.

Classification of steelheads as a trout in all waters of the state except the Columbia river. Changing the sportsmen's licenses from two to three divisions, namely, fishing licenses, upland game birds, and duck licenses and big game licenses, each one of the three to be sold at \$1.50, purchasable separately or together; said licenses to affect all minors 14 years of age and over and all women.

Restoration of state bounty on cougars and wolves with employment of experienced wolf and cougar hunters to carry on the work. A legislative committee of five was elected by the Lin Association to work for the above program at the present legislative session. Its members are P. M. Brown, Brownsville, chairman; J. G. Gill, Lebanon, and Dent Stewart, A. B. Weatherford and John Bryant, Albany.
