

"SLIP" MADIGAN MAY LEAVE ST. MARY'S COLLEGE

RUMOR STATES OSC INTERESTED IN GAEL COACH

San Francisco, Jan. 19 (AP)—The Chronicle reported today rumors around St. Mary's college say Edward Patrick "Slip" Madigan may leave the head football coaching job he has held there for the last 12 years.

His contract expires early in February.

The newspaper said for a week or more Madigan has been in secret conference with officials at the Moraga, Calif., institution with the question of finances apparently a key question. It adds word from Portland, Ore., is that Madigan is "looking around" and a movement has been started to get him to sign with Oregon State college, now without a football mentor.

Coming from Notre Dame 12 years ago Madigan built the Gael squad from a weak and little known eleven to one of the most powerful in the country. Last year, however, was not as successful as usual financially.

The report adds to an already disturbed situation on the Pacific coast insofar as football coaches are concerned. Stanford is still without a head coach since the resignation of Glenn "Pop" Warner, although only formal approval is needed to move in former assistant, Claude E. "Tiny" Thorndike, into his shoes. Oregon State has made no active move to find a successor for Paul Schisler, dean of coast conference coaches, who resigned rather than take a 10 per cent salary cut. Jimmy Phelan, now in the east has yet to sign a new contract at Washington.

San Francisco, Jan. 19 (AP)—Published reports of indications of friction between Edward Patrick "Slip" Madigan and St. Mary's college, where he has been head football coach for 12 years, were denied today by Madigan.

Madigan declined to confirm or deny rumors that he was contemplating leaving the school, whose teams he has raised to national prominence. He commented, however, that he had often thought of leaving but always remained because his relations with the school were so cordial.

He denied reports he had been in secret conferences for a week or more than college officials, saying he had been to the school but three times since the football season ended. He likewise contradicted reports he might go to Oregon State college as football mentor.
