OVER ONE FOURTH TAXES DELINQUENT

Albany, Ore.—Linn county's 1931 tax roll, on which the 1932 taxes are payable, is 27.2 per cent delinquent, according to figures obtained from the county clerk, after the sheriff's office had made its filings. The total amount of the warrant was \$890,498.88. The amount yet to be collected on this warrant is \$289,611.47.

The 1930 roll, on which 1931 taxes were paid, is delinquent 10.7 per cent, \$116,464.95 being still unpaid of a total warrant of \$1,091,562.23. Total tax delinquencies outstanding on all rolls beginning with the roll of 1926 amount to \$727,482.10. Of this \$447,995.19 represents the delinquencies of the past six years from 1926 to 1932.
