

DISTRICT HOOP TOURNAMENT WILL BE HELD HERE

BOARD SELECTS WILLAMETTE AS BATTLE SCENE

Silverton—The basketball tournament for District No. 12, to determine the school which will represent Marion and Lincoln counties in the state series, will be held on Willamette university's gym floor, Friday and Saturday, March 10 and 11. This was the decision reached in the office of the state superintendent of public instruction at Salem this week when a committee consisting of Bain, Woodburn, Kramer, Silverton and Hudson of Albany met to discuss preliminary plans.

The district tournament plan will be the same as that prevailing last year when the affair was staged at Albany college. The winners of A and B leagues in each county will enter the district tourney, thus making four teams in competition. Opponents for each contest will be selected by lot.

Last year Silverton won the district tournament, going through the series at Albany without a defeat, subsequently taking part in the state show. The Silver Foxes were defeated by Corvallis in its first appearance, then beat Oregon City and was finally eliminated by Marshfield.

This year Silverton apparently is stronger than ever and should it win the title in Marion county by defeating Chemawa would likely have little difficulty in taking the district championship. Chemawa defeated Silverton early in the season but the game was ruled out because the state board decided the Indians used an ineligible man. This game will be played over probably on Willamette's floor as a preliminary to one of the Whitman-Willamette games.

Salem high is not concerned in the district tournament, since it automatically is included in the teams to compete.

HOCKEY RETURNING TO PORTLAND RINK

Portland, Jan. 20 (AP)—The "fastest game in the world" will return to Portland, probably next week.

Hockey professionally slumped from the Pacific northwest during the past two seasons, will be revived here when a squad of former stars meets one of four teams of the Seattle city league.

H. J. Sandberg, manager of the Portland team, announced today that arrangements for a series had been completed with Dr. Gordon Dempsey, president of the Seattle league.

The tentative schedule calls for one game here each week. All four Seattle teams will appear at the Coliseum to participate in the eight game schedule. Arrangements are now being made to stage the first game next Thursday.

Practice sessions for the local squad started early this week.

Baseball's Parade Of Hold-Outs Marches On; Ruth, Gehrig Keep Step

New York, Jan. 20 (AP)—Under the impetus of Babe Ruth's much publicized salary argument with the New York Yankees, baseball, through its hold-out parade, has just about swept all other athletics off the sport pages.

Protests from high class performers against the size of the pay cuts they've been asked to take have been mounting rapidly and apparently major league magnates will have to use every argument in their repertoire to swing their recalcitrant stars into line before the spring training season.

It's not the principle of the thing, the athletes, say, but the amount of cash involved.

The world champion Yankees, of course, have been most prominently mentioned in the holdout news. Ruth, asked to accept \$50,000 for 1933 instead of the \$75,000 he was paid last season, said yesterday he was prepared to accept a cut of 10 or, at the most, 15 per cent.

The guess of the baseball correspondents was that the Babe and Col. Jacob Ruppert eventually would split the difference between \$75,000 and \$50,000 on a contract calling for a salary of \$62,500 for 1933.

Lou Gehrig, who was paid \$27,000 for doing his chores at first base for the Yankees last year, also has balked at the size of the cut the Yankees have asked him to accept but expects to settle his differences with the club this week.

Vernon Gomez, one of the two members of the champions' lineup who were granted increases, also is prepared to argue that his work last season entitled him to a bigger boost.

The New York Giants have had little trouble signing their players so far but it was understood that Fred Fitzsimmons, start right hander, can be added to the list of hold-outs.

Bozeman and Cochran used their tests of yesterday to share the lead with Jackson. Bozeman led almost all the way to defeat Otto Reisel of Philadelphia, last year's runner-up, 50 to 45 in 45 innings. Cochran played brilliantly to defeat Arthur Thurnbull of Chicago, champion in 1930, 50 to 43 in 39 innings. Reisel and Cochran had high runs of 8. Thurnbull racked up a ten, and Bozeman got a seven.
