

SALEM AND CHEMAWA QUINTS PLAY TUESDAY EVE

SPEEDY CONTEST PROBABLE WHEN 2 TEAMS CLASH

Salem high's basketball squad, "ripped" through the loss of Morley, center, who may be forced to undergo an appendectomy operation, will clash with Chemawa, strong rival for athletic honors, Tuesday night on the local floor. With Coach Huntington and Coach Lavelle stressing the fast breaking game, the contest is expected to develop into a speed affair. The Indians, too, will be handicapped Tuesday night, for they have lost Vivette and Hatfield, two of their best shots.

Coach Huntington will probably use the same combination against the Redskins he sent against the freshman squad of Willamette Friday night. Engle will take the tipoff position, with Brownell and Mosher at guard and Kelley and Wintermute, forwards. Although Engle is a bit backward about shooting, it is expected he will gain confidence with experience and develop into a first class game artist. Blue Brownell was extremely tired following Friday night's game due to the fact he had not been able to practice for several days. He is expected to be in better condition Tuesday evening.

Chemawa has not been able to win a court battle from Salem for several seasons, although the Indians gave Coach Huntington's men a real thrill last season when they came within one point of forcing the game into an overtime period after trailing by 18 points at the end of the third quarter. In that contest Vivette was particularly hot and shot nine baskets just about as fast as it was possible to shoot. Warsaw, Poland, Jan. 23 (AP)—Miss Stanislaw Malasiewicz (Stella Walsh) who won the women's 100 meter dash for Poland at the Los Angeles Olympic Games, today was being treated for a leg injury which may end her athletic career.

This famous 22-year-old Polish girl tripped over the railroad tracks at a grade crossing in Lemberg Saturday, fell to the ground and lay there helpless for hours before her plight was discovered.

She was taken to a Warsaw specialist who said she had sprained her ankle and torn a tendon in her leg. He said it was doubtful if she would be able to run again.

TROJANS, BEARS LEAD IN SOUTH

San Francisco, Jan. 23 (AP)—Undeclared Bears of the University of California and Trojans of U.S.C. stood at the top of the southern division, Pacific Coast conference basketball race today.

The Bears added number three to their string of victories by trouncing Stanford's Indians 37 to 23 in Berkeley Saturday night. At the same time, the Trojans in a Los Angeles contest, ran wild to defeat the University of California at Los Angeles 49 to 27.

Led by Hal Effert, flashy forward, who topped the individual scores with 17 tallies, the Bears romped away from the Indians after a hard first half which ended with Stanford holding a 14-13 advantage. The victory was the 22nd for the Bears over their traditional rivals in eight years. Stanford has won but twice in that time, once in 1925 and again in 1931.

The contest between the two southern teams was a free-for-all battle in which 32 personal fouls were recorded. At half-time the Trojans, who took an early lead, had a 29-9 advantage.

Both Stanford and U.C.L.A. have lost three games and won none.

PACIFIC LEAGUERS TALK ADMISSIONS

San Francisco, Jan. 23 (AP)—A bitter controversy over a proposal to reduce bleacher seats to 25 cents at Pacific coast league baseball games this year was in prospect here today as club owners of the circuit gathered for their winter meeting.

The lower admission price will restore waning popularity in baseball, owners of the San Francisco, Missions and Oakland clubs contended in advancing the "two-bit" admission proposal.

Strong opposition to the proposal was expected from the heads of the Sacramento, Portland, Seattle and Hollywood clubs. Los Angeles has indicated a willingness to vote for reduced prices. Should the four opposing clubs stick to their attitude, the proposal would be defeated.

Morals of the San Francisco Seals will, if the measure is defeated, seek to have each club granted the authority to fix admission prices in its own city. If this move finds favor, the three teams in the bay region will reduce bleacher seats to 25 cents.

Portland, Jan. 23 (AP)—The University of Washington basketball team stayed on the straight and narrow path to the northern division title in the final game of a two-game series at Eugene by winning from the lowly Oregon basketball team 44 to 34 Saturday night. The Huskies had taken the opening contest of the series 56 to 38 Friday.

Oregon gave the northwesterners a stiff battle in the opening period and were behind but 22 to 17 as the stanza closed. Washington swept to an easy victory with its fast work in the last half.

An upset at Moscow gave the Vandals of Idaho their first conference win when Washington State fell before a flashing Vandal attack 40 to 20. Tied with 12 points each as the whistle ended the opening session the valiant Idahoans smothered practically every Cougar scoring threat while scoring heavily themselves.

Pointed out as an almost certain indication of which team will finish first in their division, the undefeated Huskies of Washington opened a two-game clash against the Oregon State hoopers at Corvallis tonight with the winner a likely champion.

Penny Collecting Interesting

How long has it been since you saw an Indian head penny? Maybe you have not given any thought to the matter, being the sort of person to give all the pennies to the children anyway. But if you have to count your pennies you may have noticed that it is many a day since the Indian heads went out of circulation, to be replaced by the head of Lincoln, the latter being composed of a different mixture of metals which gives it a different color from the old "red cent."

The Lincoln penny is beautifully done on the Lincoln side, but the printing on the opposite side which informs us that it is one cent is far from artistic, and one misses the familiar wreath and the notched edges of the old edition. The date also is done in small figures destined to wear away in less time than the Indians in circulation as far back as my mother can remember, and she is 85 years old, all of which lends up to my collection of pennies, numbering 172, although I haven't got all the pennies in the world.

"Doc" Laird, a clerk at the Model Food Store in Salem, has hundreds of them, he says, but he doesn't know how old is the oldest, and a clerk at the general delivery window at the Salem post office has "hundreds," maybe millions by this time, for he told me about them a year ago, when stern necessity compelled me to part with a couple of mine to mail a letter, and he was surprised that any person should be walking about with as many as two Indian head pennies at one time. Then there is William Mootry, whose brother works at the Woolpert drug store, and who told me of his brother's collection of about 40 pennies with an effort made to get the dates consecutively from the first to the last issue, his oldest one being 1865. I have one of that date and one a year older, and as there was one with the date badly scarred I took it to Pomeroy's jewelry store where they obligingly inspected it with a powerful magnifying glass and it proved to be only 1884, a comparatively young penny.

The word Liberty is worn from nearly every Indian penny, the word appearing on a band in very small letters about the brow of the noble red man, but that is the greatest wear any of them shows although the youngest in my collection bears date of 1909. The Lincoln edition coming on in 1911 to commemorate the 100th birthday of the martyr president, but I do not know the age of the oldest in circulation, although Mrs. Louise Hall of Brooks owns a penny that has an interesting history connected with it. When her late husband was a young boy in the south, he, with other youngsters, used to dive to the bottom of the Mississippi river, and to show that they had really been to the bottom, they would bring up a handful of mud as proof. On one memorable occasion young Billy Hall found that he had brought up a penny along with the mud, a coin that has been very precious to the family in the half century since the incident.

The Indian pennies are worth one cent in the open market but to those of us who collect them they are priceless, and when someone is about to give me a penny I find my eyes getting as big as saucers, and I glance this way and that until I have it safely at home where I enjoy the pride of possession to the utmost. And while to people who are not collectors they bear a striking resemblance to each other, I know each one by some particular scar, or color or worn place, even if there were no date to guide me. A. T. Woolpert of the drug store gave me three, Henry Girod, of the Maple dairy, gave me one, Bill Hall of Brooks gave me two, Mrs. Carl Asplund of the Brooks Purify store gave me one, and the other 165 were given me by C. V. Ashbaur, who carries mail on a rural route out of Brooks and who received them from his patrons who desired postage stamps for them, although the three cent postage has caused a marked falling off in the number of letters written, I hear.

I wash the pennies in soapsuds quite often, and recently gave them a bath in vinegar for several hours, which made them look like gold pieces. That is my collection of gold pieces, although I have not seen a

ILLUSION:
This very old illusion was invented by Indian fakirs. The secret was unearthed in 1849 by the great magician, Robert-Houdin. At that time, ether had just been discovered, and little was known about it. Houdin claimed that he had discovered that this new anesthetic could make people light as air. To prove it, he caused the subject to rise into the air and float apparently suspended. He passed a hoop around the body to show there were no wires or supports.

EXPLANATION:
There are many, many explanations for this old trick. One is that the girl wears a concealed harness, which ends in a socket between her shoulder blades. This is attached to a piston below the stage. The piston is pushed up from below, causing her to rise in the air. The piston is invisible, because it is covered with mirrors which reflect surrounding draperies, similar to the background. The magician can pass the hoop over her body because it is cut in one place. It can be pulled apart for a second when it passes the piston.
