

ANNUAL DINNER SCIO'S ALUMNI BRINGS CROWD

Scio—Nearly 100 teachers, former teachers and graduates of the high school at Scio assembled Saturday evening for the first annual banquet and alumni homecoming.

Rolla Shelton, a member of the graduating class of 1911, acted as toastmaster for the occasion. During the banquet a program was presented by the students of the high school and two musical numbers were given by former graduates.

Following the banquet brief addresses and reminiscences of former school days were given by graduates.

An outline of the building of the school gymnasium was presented by H. E. Tobie, a former principal. A gymnasium committee was first appointed by the Knights of Pythias lodge on December 20, 1921. Serving on this committee were Fred Jones, Frank Bartu and the late J. S. Sticha. This committee immediately formulated a plan for cooperation with the high school student body in the sale of bonds for the erection of a gymnasium. On February 12, 1922, members of the high school gym committee sold the necessary number of bonds and plans were considered for specification of the building. Most of the labor for the edifice was donated by students and interested townspeople under the supervision of two carpenters. The building was finished and dedicated at a dance on November 25, 1922. A copy of the events during the erection of the gymnasium was placed in a box in the corner stone of the building.

C. M. Coffey, now of Portland, a graduate of the class of 1904, was the oldest alumni present. Coffey gave a succinct and delightful picture of Scio high school as he knew it. Notable among his remarks was the mention of the planting of the locust trees on the school grounds.

There were members present of nearly all the graduating classes since that time. The class of 1911 was the first to graduate from the four-year course, those previous being only two-year courses. Rolla Shelton, a member of this class, has the unique distinction of having a daughter, Arduth, graduate from his one Alma Mater with the class of 1930.

The class of 1916 further improved the school grounds by planting the row of rose bushes, all of which are still living, around the south and east sides of the grounds. In 1920 those graduating from the high school presented the building with a drinking fountain on the first floor. The class of 1922 was instrumental in promoting the erection of the gymnasium.

The last class to graduate from the high school at Scio, that of 1932, has also the distinction of being the largest ever to complete the course. Eighteen students constituted the membership.

Talks by Miss Edith Pentney and Mrs. Elta Morcum Sims, former teachers, and P. A. Galleghy, present principal of the high school, also featured the evening.

Following the talk a short business meeting, at which the alumni association was formally organized, was effected. Officers elected for the following year, all by unanimous ballot are as follows: Rolla Shelton, president; Mrs. Birdelle Sticha, vice-president; and Mrs. E. D. Myers, secretary-treasurer.

It was voted to hold the alumni banquet annually on the second Saturday in April of each year. An informal vote of thanks was given to members of the Scio Parent-Teachers' association and others who helped in the preparation of the banquet.

CHRISTIAN CHURCH LEADS IN SURVEY
