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FARMERS' FIRE RELIEF MEETS AT SUBLIMITY

Sublimity—The 37th annual meeting of the Farmers' Fire Relief association of Sublimity assembled at Sublimity January 21 with the largest membership in attendance since its organization. Members were present from Salem, Woodburn, Mt. Angel, Silverton, Sebo, Dallas, Cottage Grove, Dayton and McMinnville.

The secretary's report showed insurance written during 1932 was \$42,330. On January 1 this year there were 1,294 policies in force, insuring 2,644 buildings and contents for \$1,576,574. The treasurer's report indicated receipts, premiums from new members, as \$1,766.55; assessments, \$4,707.11; and interest received, \$3,573.50, making a total of \$6,031.16. The amount paid out for five fire losses was \$3,242, making the total paid for fire losses since 1896 \$22,093.44. Net surplus on hand is \$8,323.98.

An instructive and interesting address was made by J. M. Sehan, chief deputy of the insurance department, and by Mr. Taylor, of the fire marshal's office, on the benefits of the Mutual Farmers' Fire Relief associations.

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FARMER UNION CO-OP'S ANNUAL REPORT GIVEN

Dallas—Stockholders of the Polk county Farmers' Union Oil company held their first annual meeting Monday in the W. O. W. hall here. Highlights of the meeting were the declaration of dividends and the payment of the same to the stockholders present and the reelection of the two retiring directors for a two year term.

The company was started ten months ago and \$23,293.33 worth of business has been transacted in that time. The dividend paid Monday was the second patronage dividend and the regular dividend on preferred stock. The organization owns and operates a distributing plant at Derry station and payments on the tank truck which is used in making deliveries are being completed rapidly.

R. O. Dodson, president, and R. W. Hogg, secretary, are the directors who were reelected for an additional term of two years. Hold-over directors are Ronald Jones, Brooks, C. L. Gilson, Perrydale, and George Woods, Ballston.

An amendment was adopted Monday which will enable farmers who are not now members of the organization to become affiliated, not only with the Oil company but also with the Farmers' Union. This can be done through the assignment of their patronage dividends. Any farmer who patronizes the company plus dues in the Farmers' Union will automatically become a member of both organizations.

The Polk county company was the first cooperative unit of its kind to be started in western Oregon. According to an announcement made at Monday's meeting similar concerns are being launched in the near future in Yamhill, Washington and Columbia counties.

Sixty members were present at the meeting including quite a number from Marion county. Numerous farmers in both counties are served by the local concern.

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FARMERS TALK TUITION LAWS AT MASS MEET

Chemawa—An enthusiastic meeting of serious minded farmers was held at the Keizer schoolhouse Monday night to discuss the transportation and tuition law.
