

SALEM WILD BATTLE FROM CHEMAWA, 29-28

WHISTLE BLASTS EXCITE PLAYERS SCORERS MIXED

With the referee's whistle cord tied down and walling like a banshee and with players of both sides becoming infected with the excitement which prevailed in all quarters, Salem high's basketball squad won a wild contest over Chemawa Tuesday night, 29 to 28. Confusion reigned supreme from the moment the first of the many fouls was impartially called until the referee, after a perusal of several scorebooks and conferences with team members, coaches and the equipment keeper, announced that "I find that Salem has won 29 to 28."

As predicted the contest was extremely fast, although the officiating soon had all players jumping and running around like a bunch of scared jackrabbits. Chemawa, which was particularly adept from the foul line, took a 6 to 2 lead at quarter time, all points being made on conversions with the exception of one field goal made by Chemawa. Coach Huntington's boys found the range soon after the first of the second quarter and Kelley's shot knotted the count at 6-all. From that point on it was nip and tuck, although the redskins at one stage managed to gain a four-point lead. The half ended with Salem ahead 11 to 10.

During the third period the advantage swung from one side to the other. Two shots from the foul line by Dogaegle put the visitors out in front 20 to 18 at three quarter time.

Pandemonium reigned supreme during the final session. Finally Engle went out on fouls while Brownell was forced to the bench through an injury to an ankle. With Chemawa leading by four points, Salem put on more steam and shots by Kelley and Thomas and a free throw by DeJardin shifted the lead once more. With about a minute to go Salem tried to keep possession of the ball, but Dogaegle, who proved one of the best ball hawkers turned out by Chemawa in recent years, snared the ball and made a dash toward the basket. It looked like a sure win for Chemawa. However, he was pressed so hard that he failed to connect and the ball went to Salem on an out of bounds play.

Whether a foul was called on Chemawa or whether the Indians called for time out for the fourth time just as the game ended nobody seemed able to determine. The score books showed Salem ahead 29 to 28 but the referees announced the count was 28-all. So while both teams sat on the floor waiting for developments the referee wrangled a decision 29 to 28. A check of Salem's scorebook and a comparison with newspaper scorers left no doubt of the correctness of the final count, although Chemawa's book was one point short. In the excitement the free throw which Salem was entitled to was forgotten and the teams went to the showers.

Silverton—The Indians of Chemawa will creep into the territory of the Silver Foxes, Friday night, and whether or not the natives will be scalped depends on the outcome of the game as Silverton and Chemawa are tied for first place in the Willamette Inter-Scholastic league. The winner of the two game series between these two schools will be declared the champions of Marion county and be given the right to enter the district tournament.

Silverton's prospects to win look a little brighter than at first since the initial encounter has been called off because a player was judged ineligible with Chemawa, and another star of the visitors has graduated. Nevertheless, Silverton is on her toes with real concern as to the results with her most capable of rivals, and the game promises to be one of the best of the season.

FIRPO DEFEATS WES KETCHELL IN 10 ROUNDS

Portland, Jan. 25 (AP)—Unleashing a baffling battery of punches from an unconventional crouch, young Firpo of Burke, Idaho, wrested a ten-round decision from Wesley Ketchell of Portland and Los Angeles in the main event of last night's fight card here, and earned a claim to the Pacific coast light-heavyweight title. Firpo weighed 175 and Ketchell 163 1/2.

The affray was a fury of flailing fists from the first bell and surged to a dramatic climax in the seventh and eighth rounds.

In that terrific seventh, Firpo with a whirlwind of long lefts smacked Ketchell four times to the canvas, three times for the count of nine.

After a brief respite between rounds, Ketchell answered the bell for the last round with a freshness that belied his recent punishment and tipped into Firpo with an attack that culminated in a left to the jaw that sent the Idahoan down for the count of eight. A second later the bout ended. But Firpo's advantage throughout the match was too great for anything but a favorable decision.

Firpo, a normally right-hander, assumed a southpaw stance to offset Ketchell's wicked left, and the strategy apparently baffled his opponent.

Jack Thompson, 138, Oakland, Cal., took a four-round decision from Mickey Dolan, 142, Portland. Paul Karch, 149, Portland, won a four-round decision from Dick Gilman, 145, Oregon City, and Eddie Spina, 124, took the opening four-rounder from Chuck Carnera, 123, Seattle, by a decision.

FACULTY HOOPSTERS ENGAGE SALEM 'B'

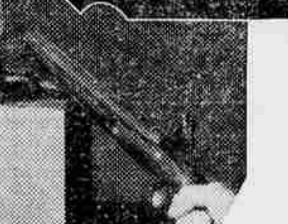

Earl Sande who came out of the west to catch the fancy of the racing public, is preparing to stage another comeback—his third in the last five years.

Apparently the quiet little westerner, America's premier jockey from 1918 to 1928, is still haunted by the same desire to ride that resulted in many a parental reprimand in his boyhood days on the plains of Idaho.

Twenty years ago the Earl, then a sandy-haired, freckled face lad, wanted to become a jockey. The idea did not meet with the approval of his mother. But Earl insisted and one day jumped out a window of his school and ran away with the cowboys so he could ride their horses.

Today he is a licensed trainer in charge of eight promising thoroughbreds, quartered at Belmont park. But still he wants to ride. And ride he will if the Maryland racing commission will grant him a license next spring.

Four years before Sande announced his first retirement, he was thrown from a horse at Saratoga and for weeks wavered between life and death. The racing world said he would never ride again but even while still bed-ridden, the Earl said he would be back in the saddle booting 'em home to the cheers of the crowds.

In 1928, Sande said he was tired, was getting old, was beginning to take on weight and that he was going to retire from the saddle, buy a string of horses and try his luck at training.

WON ON OWN HORSE
He bought a half-dozen horses and for a few months was content to get them in condition for the races. Then he was seized with an obsession to ride again, and in the spring of 1929 he mounted Hermi-

Corvallis, Ore., Jan. 25 (AP)—The Huskies from Washington university retained their lead in the Pacific coast conference northern division basketball race by defeating Oregon State college, 30 to 24, here last night after trailing the orange-men throughout the first half.

The Oregon State five started with a rush that netted them a 12 to 5 lead, but an answering spurt by Washington brought the Huskies within two points of their opponents at half time, when the score stood 15 to 13 for Oregon State.

Then Washington produced three free throws and a couple of baskets while Oregon State was making but one conversion, and the game went home with the visitors. Cap Roberts, Oregon center, gave the Vandals plenty of trouble with his accurate basket shooting. He scored seven field goals for a total of 16 points.

DALLAS TOWN TEAM HAS GOOD RECORD
