TAXES TOPIC FORUM DINNER

Silverton—Reports of the legislative committee with the findings to be sent each member of the legislature featured the monthly dinner of the chamber of commerce Wednesday evening.

Among the recommendations adopted were the hope that the tax burden would be lifted from real property but that a general sales tax is not a good idea; reduction in the cost of government; favoring a sales tax on luxuries and increasing the income and inheritance taxes; a \$5 auto license fee with a small graduated property tax on cars or an additional cent gasoline tax; manufacture of license plates at the penitentiary; issuance of permanent license plates and enactment of regulatory utility laws to encourage the extension of lines into rural communities. Members of the legislative committee of the forum are Al O. Nelson, chairman, M. G. Gunderson, Ed Porter and R. Fish.

Minor committee reports were made by Norris Ames on the industrial undertakings and Ed Banks on the probable inadvisability of the renewal of the work of the visitation committee this year. A member of the legislature addressed the gathering and spoke on matters touched upon in the committee's report. The meeting was one of the largest attended in months.
