

WILLAMETTE ENGAGES OIL TEAM SATURDAY NIGHT

KLOOSTRA BACK WITH BEARCATS NEXT SEMESTER

Basketball competition at Willamette university, after a let down of a week except for the daily work-out, will be resumed Saturday night when Coach Keene's Bearcats clash with the Union Oil company squad for the second time of the season. The game which will be played on the local floor will be preceded at 7 o'clock by a contest between Willamette freshmen and the town team of Turner.

Willamette has not engaged in competition with an outside club since the victory over Columbia last Saturday night. Perhaps it has been just as well since the bugaboo of semester exams has rested heavily upon the players with a consequent slowing up of action. The Bearcats looked extremely ragged in practice Thursday afternoon, the players apparently unable to keep their minds on the business at hand.

Irwin Kloostra, who held down the tipoff position for two years for Willamette, returned to school this week and immediately started working out with Coach Keene's squad. He will not be used in conference games until the start of next semester. It is likely he will be shifted to a forward position where his reach will be most effective.

The Union Oil company team defeated Willamette 36 to 23 earlier in the year. The squad is composed of some of the best collegiate performers of the northwest, including Charney, "Buck" Grayson, Edwards, Levoff and Dolp.

There will be no northwest conference engagements for Willamette until February 3 and 4 when Albany will be taken on in a two game series.

JOE JUDGE SIGNS DODGER CONTRACT

New York, Jan. 27 (AP)—Joe Judge, veteran first baseman who recently was given his release by the Washington Senators, today signed a contract with the Brooklyn Dodgers of the National baseball league.

Signing the veteran Judge, for years one of the leading players of the American league, plus a gap at first on the Dodgers which they tried to fill unsuccessfully all last year after Del Bissonette was injured in spring training.

Bissonette recently underwent another operation for his heel injury and it is doubtful if he will be in shape to play this year, at least not at the start of the season.

As a 16-year man in the American league he was entitled to his release if all other clubs waived on his services.

BRITISH FIGHTER SCRAPS LA BARBA

New York, Jan. 27 (AP)—John Mortimer, manager of Seaman Watson, Great Britain's newest contribution to the gayety of nations, today issued the usual pre-battle predictions of victory which caused the wise boys to continue laying two to one that Fido La Barba slaps the sailor down when they meet at the Garden tonight.

Both Watson and La Barba, former flyweight champion, will scale 128 pounds. Watson's British title will not be at stake. The boxing fraternity think Seaman will be a "pushover" for La Barba.

Although Seaman will be the first British featherweight title-holder in 22 years to exhibit his wares in an American ring, his debut is a flop in advance because of a poor showing against three preliminary boys in a "jury trial."

Vines' cannonball service held little terror for him, the youngster frequently making returns of what appeared to be sure "aces."

Intercollegiate Rowing Races May Take Place Over Olympic Course

Los Angeles, Jan. 27 (AP)—A movement to replace the recently cancelled Poughkeepsie regatta was under way in southern California today when it was learned an attempt was being made to obtain guarantees for an event of equal magnitude at Long Beach.

Athletic authorities of the University of California at Los Angeles are working with city and county officials and officials of Long Beach to stage the national intercollegiate races at the Olympic rowing course. It was understood invitations were being drafted for Harvard, Yale, Princeton, Syracuse, Columbia, Navy, California, and Washington universities to participate.

Sponsors were considering ways and means of raising an amount up to \$45,000 to underwrite traveling expenses for visiting crews.

"There have been informal discussions of the plan and we are going to try to get underwriting for it," said Steve Cunningham, athletic manager of U. C. L. A. "We are not certain, of course, that any of the eastern colleges can accept even if we get proper backing, but only Wisconsin and Cornell, I understand, were compelled to give up all crew activities, and it seems logical that a number of the others will be able to come here."

WARNER AIDES TO BE NAMED
