

# PHELAN SIGNS CONTRACT WITH U. OF WASHINGTON

## HUSKIES MENTOR RETURNING FOR 3 YEAR PERIOD

Seattle, Jan. 28 (AP)—Football Coach Jimmy Phelan, one-time mentor of a Big Ten champion at Purdue, has cast his lot again with Pacific coast football and will return to the University of Washington for the next three years.

His signed contract calling for a renewal of his present term which expires in June, was in the hands of University officials today.

In a message last night from Chicago, the dynamic leader of the Huskies asked Ward Kumm, a former member of the institution's board of regents, to release a signed document which he had left in Seattle before going east several weeks ago.

Capping weeks of uncertainty, during which Phelan was reported under consideration for a position at some eastern institution and during which financial problems of the University of Washington student organization which finances athletics loomed large, his decision was received with enthusiasm on the campus and over the state.

"All that I have asked is assurance that the authorities intend to maintain an athletic policy which will permit me to do a good job of coaching. From information I have, they want a football team next year. I am going to give them one."

Phelan returns with good prospects for next year, after a season last fall in which three consecutive victories were won, including ones over Stanford and U. C. L. A., two were tied, with Washington State and Oregon, and two lost, to California and the University of Southern California. The California game was lost by one point, 7 to 6, and the Southern California game also by a close score, 9 to 6.

His speedy sophomore backfield and most of the line will be back next fall, with the most severe losses his two ends, Nisbet and W. Smith.

The definite terms of the contract were not revealed, but university officials said that he had taken a reduction from his present salary. Unofficial reports said that he will receive \$10,000 a year.

His wife and their two daughters were jubilant when the word of his decision reached them.

"I don't like the eastern climate," Mrs. Phelan said, "and besides we own our home here, and one of the children is in school."

In formally announcing the decision, Kumm said in a statement that "Phelan's heart is in the work here."

"He is anxious to put Washington on an even plane with the University of Southern California in the football world. He is keeping his promise, made when he left for the east, and is coming back to go to work."

Pullman, Wash., Jan. 28 (AP)—Oregon took its seventh conference basketball defeat of the season here last night when Washington State walked off with a 45 to 28 victory.

The Cougars dominated the game throughout, holding a 25-5 lead at half time. Oregon was able to gather only two field goals and a free throw. Stevens, Webfoot guard, staged a one-man attack in the second half, throwing in seven baskets in quick order to take high scoring honors with 14.

With only ten minutes to play, Coach Phil withdrew his Cougar regulars and rushed in reserves. Oregon again picked up momentum but the threat was stopped after running the score to 36-28.

Cross, forward, topped the Cougar scorers with 10. Gordon, center, and Willis, guard, netted nine each. Cap Roberts, stellar Oregon center, was held to one basket.

The victory raised W.S.C. to a tie with Oregon State for second place. Each has won five games and lost three.

## LODELL WILL BE ATHLETIC HEAD OREGON STATE

Corvallis, Ore., Jan. 28 (AP)—Carl Lodell, graduate manager at Oregon State college for ten years, today assumed the position as chairman of athletics.

The appointment, announced last night by the board of control, is the first step in a reorganization of the athletic department following the resignation of Paul J. Schisler, head football coach and director of athletics. Chancellor W. J. Kerr approved the selection, which extends to July 1.

Lodell's duties will consist of supervision of equipment, fields, coaching staffs and all other tasks formerly handled by Schisler, who has been granted leave of absence until his resignation takes effect July 1. Schisler expects to leave for the east early next month.

Lodell is the dean of Pacific coast conference graduate managers. He graduated in 1922 from Oregon State, where he was an outstanding athlete. He will retain his present position in addition to assuming duties of athletic chairman.

Selection of a new coach was not discussed at the board meeting. Approximately 50 coaches have applied for the position as head football coach. Before a selection is made, however, "feelers" will be sent out to other coaches. It was indicated, with the probability that spring practice opening may be delayed.
