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PAINTINGS BY VINCENT WILL BE ON DISPLAY

Andrew M. Vincent with whom Salem is well acquainted, and who exhibited his paintings in the Bishop home several years ago, will exhibit his paintings in the exhibit in the fireplace room of the Salem public library during the week of February 6. The exhibit is to open Sunday afternoon at 2 p.m. on that date and will be sponsored by the Salem art league.

Mr. Vincent is now at the head of the department of painting at the University of Oregon. Mr. Vincent received his education in the Salem schools.

Smith could assign no motive for the bombing. He said he had not "hired or fired a man for years."

Included Policeman Bernard Beshon and two of the men in the crowd.

Other policemen were hampered by clouds of red pepper thrown by the rioters. This phase of the battle ended with a rush of police and the demonstrators were thrust south of the bridge to Lake street.

Michigan boulevard, from the exclusive Drake hotel to the mid-loop, was a virtual stage set for battle. Following almost daily riots in which police have been beaten in hand-to-hand fights with irate unemployed, the department had prepared today for a protracted siege.

There were 82 Lincoln Park police, 27 city mounted officers, 45 regular city police and 11 reserves. A corps of firemen and a fire truck was on call.

Pire hose was laid around the Tribune tower, into the Wrigley building across the street, and into several nearby structures. The firemen were prepared to lay down a barrage of water under high pressure.

The policemen were armed with night sticks, tear gas bombs and pick axes, in addition to their side arms. In reserve were two squad cars in which were police surgeons with emergency kits open.

Everyone going over the Michigan avenue bridge, unless obviously unarmed and not connected with the disorder, was searched.

The Japanese consul, Y. Muto, was in the Tribune tower when the disorder began. He went to the front of the building to watch.

100 CIVILIANS KILLED BY JAPANESE BOMBS
Geneva, Jan. 28 (AP)—Charges that Japanese military bombers killed more than 100 civilians in air raids on Kailan were made today to the secretary of the League of Nations by Dr. W. W. Yen, chief Chinese delegate.

The Chinese delegate said the air raid, which lasted over two hours, occurred January 22. He alleged that 11 soldiers were killed in addition to the civilians and that "a considerable number" of persons were wounded.

Dr. Yen said six bombing planes participated in the raid, dropping 200 pound bombs.

PLAN TO DEPORT FOREIGN COLONY AT HOLLYWOOD
Los Angeles, Jan. 28 (AP)—Murray W. Garson, special assistant to the secretary of labor announced today he had begun questioning of Maurer S. Sullivan, Irish boss of motion pictures, in connection with the arrest of John Farrow, film writer, on charges of overstaying a leave to enter the United States.

Besides examination of the actress in conjunction with deportation proceedings which agents said might involve Farrow, Garson stated that Miss Sullivan also was questioned about the status of her permit to reside in this country.

The actress was introduced to films by the singer, John McCormack, who discovered her in an Irish village.

A wholesale exodus of foreign talent from Hollywood was foreseen by Garson, special assistant to Secretary of Labor Doherty, who announced that all foreign actresses, actors and technicians were under scrutiny.

Farrow, allegedly a native of Australia, was arrested while attending a fashionable hotel dance in company with Mona Maria, South American actress. He was released on \$2500 bond and will be given a hearing Tuesday or Wednesday of next week on charges he overstayed his leave in this country.

The author of many short stories and screen plays, Farrow was alleged to have first entered the United States as a seaman and left the country under the threat of deportation only to return.

Farrow frequently had been reported engaged to many Hollywood beauties, including Dolores Del Rio and Lila Lee before their marriages and with Miss Sullivan. His screen plays include "The Wheel of Life" and "The Wolf Son" and "The Woman from Moscow," and others.

Tail Woman In Black Walks To White House To Inspect New Home

Washington, Jan. 28 (AP)—A tall woman in black today walked swiftly, with a long, swinging stride, up the curved driveway to the White House. It was Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt.

From the Mayflower hotel, where she had arrived early in the morning, Mrs. Roosevelt set out for the White House shortly before 11 o'clock.

Unrecognized, she swung along at a brisk walk through two small parks, where the trees are already beginning to bud. A few minutes later she crossed Pennsylvania avenue and walked swiftly up the drive to the White House entrance.

Mrs. Roosevelt arrived by train from New York at 7:30 this morning.

One of the first things she did after breakfast was to telephone Mrs. John N. Garner, wife of the vice president-elect. She suggested that, if Mrs. Garner was going to be at home, she might drop in and see her after she was through at the White House. Mrs. Roosevelt had never met Mrs. Garner.

Mrs. Garner suggested, however, that she call on Mrs. Roosevelt, instead, and was invited to stop in before Mrs. Roosevelt left for the White House.

"She sounds nice," was Mrs. Roosevelt's comment after the telephone conversation.

Rear Admiral Cary T. Grayson, chairman of the inaugural committee, and Colonel U. S. Grant, 3rd, also were callers during the morning.

The visit to the White House was followed by a luncheon with friends, and Mrs. Roosevelt planned to leave later for Atlanta by airplane with her son, Elliott. They plan to be with the president-elect on his birthday, Monday.

JURY CONVICTS PUBLIC ENEMY
Chicago, Jan. 28 (AP)—A pistol-toting conviction today menaced the standing of Murray Humphreys, listed as No. 1 on the police department's catalogue of "public enemies."

It took a jury in Judge Harold P. McCormick's court but one hour to reach the verdict which carries with it a possible maximum sentence of a year's imprisonment in the county jail, as well as a fine of \$300.

Humphreys, who said he looked to the Illinois supreme court to reverse the jury's findings, denied he was a "public enemy."

"I was given a bad name," he said, "by the Employers' association because of my union affiliations."

A raid by police on a Loop office last November resulted in Humphreys' arrest. Two policemen testified they took a pistol from him, but his counsel argued that they had no search warrant and that the seizure was illegal. Charles Fischetti and William (Three Fingered Jack) White, were arrested at the same time. Fischetti was recently convicted on a similar charge and was sentenced to a year's imprisonment. White is awaiting trial.

The court set February 4 for hearing a motion for a new trial.

LADY MARY BAILEY LOST SECOND TIME
Madrid, Jan. 28 (AP)—Lady Mary Bailey, the British flier who was lost and found last week in her flight from Croydon to Cape Town, was reported lost again today.

On Thursday she landed because of engine trouble at San Xavier, on the way back to England. She took off when repairs were made but there has been no word from her since 10 a. m. yesterday.

M'NEAL CONVICTED FOR FOREST FIRE
Portland, Jan. 28 (AP)—Charles McNeil was convicted in federal court yesterday of inducing another person to set fire in the Siskiyou national forest near the Rogue river. Sentence will be pronounced Tuesday. McNeil was indicted by the federal grand jury on a charge of inducing Kenneth Olsen to set a fire near Whiskey Creek in Josephine county.

Olsen appeared as a government witness. He was arrested when the fire was set and later was paroled under a one-year sentence.

'Turn-Around' Swept By Seaside Waves
Astoria, Ore., Jan. 28 (AP)—Considerable damage was caused to the Oates Baths building on the Seaside sea front late yesterday when two or three big waves broke over the seawall at high tide. One wave broke in the front of a shop in the building. Logs
