

BEAVERS PLAY WASHINGTON IN CRUCIAL SERIES

Seattle, Jan. 30 (AP)—A mid-season lapse in basketball play in the northern division of the Pacific Coast conference sees only two games scheduled this week, but they are games between the powerful University of Washington Huskies, league leaders, and the strong Oregon State Beavers.

Splitting their first two-game series at Corvallis last week, the two teams clash here on Friday and Saturday nights. A double win for the Beavers will put them at the top of the conference race, while Washington will have an almost unbeatable lead by winning twice.

Bob Galt, sophomore Husky forward, whose brilliant work helped save one of the previous games with the Beavers, is still nursing an injured foot but may be in condition to play, Coach Hec Edmundson said today.

Meanwhile, at Pullman on Saturday night, the Washington State Cougars won again from Oregon, 27 to 22, handing the Oregon five its eighth consecutive defeat. By sweeping the two games, Washington State moved into second place in the race.

San Francisco, Jan. 30 (AP)—Still undefeated, the University of Southern California Trojans held top place in the southern division, Pacific Coast conference, basketball race today.

The Trojans, who gained the lead by defeating the University of California Bears, 32 to 26, at Los Angeles Friday, added another game to their margin by beating the Bears again Saturday, 31 to 29, on the same court.

Stanford and the University of California at Los Angeles split a two-game series at Stanford to tie for the cellar position. U. C. L. A. won Friday, 44 to 36. Stanford evened matters by taking the Saturday game, 41 to 38.

But one game is scheduled for each team this week. Stanford and California will meet at Stanford Saturday while the Trojans and U. C. L. A. battle at Los Angeles the same night.

3 Portland Teams Lead League Play

Portland, Jan. 30 (AP)—Three Portland high school basketball teams, Lincoln, Jefferson and Franklin, swept into a three-way tie and a commanding lead over other squads in the 1933 race for the Portland Interscholastic hoop title by taking two straight contests in the opening frays of the schedule played last week.

Franklin, coached by Charles (Chaplin) King was the big surprise of the initial games in winning from Roosevelt and then speeding to a win over Benson Tech, 1932 league winner. The number of undefeated teams is expected to diminish during the present week as Jefferson plays both Lincoln and Franklin.

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HUNTINGTON NOT DOWNCAST OVER LOSS OF GAMES

Salem high's basketball team, home again after losing games to Tillamook and Astoria high by two point margins, will take to the road again Tuesday night when it journeys to Oregon City for a return engagement with the high school quint of that place. And although Coach Huntington's men had little difficulty in defeating Oregon City here earlier in the season, winning on the latter's floor will be much more difficult due to the cracker box proportions of the down river court.

While Salem's invasion of the north coast towns was not successful from a winning standpoint, Coach Huntington was far from disappointed over the showing of his men. He feels that when Tillamook and Astoria come here on February 14 and 24, respectively his players will have better than an even chance to reverse the count. An even break in the games last week would probably have resulted in wins for Salem.

Tillamook's ability to control the tip-off largely responsible for the Cheesemakers' win Friday night, although Salem held a 11 to 3 advantage at the end of the first period. Tillamook came back strong at the start of the second quarter and collected 6 points within a space of a few seconds.

Failure of the referee to follow the game closely worked a hardship on the red and black at Astoria, Mosher, who went into the game nursing a boil on one arm, was forced to leave the game when an opponent hacked him so hard that he nearly fainted. Even at that the referee failed to call a foul. The loss of Mosher was keenly felt since most of Astoria's scoring was accomplished from the section of the floor vacated by this hustling guard.

Coach Warren of Astoria has four lettermen on his squad, Averill, center being placed on the eligibility list just before the Salem game. In addition to Averill the team has Canessa, Orwig and Mackey from last year's champion squad in addition to a youngster named Foster who has won a lot of independent hall although this is his first year on the Astoria squad.

Salem reached home at 4:30 Sunday morning. With the exception of a few miles in the Willamette valley, the entire trip was through country covered by snow.

NORWEGIAN SKI JUMPER WINS AT SNOQUALMIE

Seattle, Jan. 30 (AP)—Only three years in this country from Norway, the land of the ski jumpers, Tom Moberaaten, 23 year old Vancouver, B. C. youth, today held the Pacific northwest all-around ski championship, won against stiff competition on the Snoqualmie pass course. With jumps of 169 feet and 172 feet yesterday, he took a second place in the class A jumping, and combined with a third place on Saturday in the 10 mile cross country race, he won the all-around title. His point score was 440.3.

Right behind him, however, with 439.8 points was Hjalmar Hvam, of the Cascade club, Portland, who holds the title of national class A combined racing and jumping champion. He won the cross country race on Saturday, but failed to place among the eight prize winners in the jumping yesterday.

Another Canadian, Arne Wato, of the Grouse Mountain club, Vancouver, was in third in the combined championship, with a fourth in the cross country event and a total of 194.8 points in the jumping, although he, too, failed to finish among the eight prize winners.

PETERSON WINNER WASATCH DOG RACE

Ogden, Utah, Jan. 30 (AP)—Ray Peterson, tireless dog musher of St. Anthony, Idaho, won the fourth annual 21-mile Wasatch dog derby yesterday by the slim margin of only 14 seconds.

Pressed all the way by Roy Stover, McCall, Idaho, Peterson's team of Irish and Llewellyn setters achieved a winning spurt in the last lap that brought victory. Twenty-five hundred enthusiastic fans cheered Peterson as his panting team crossed the finish line.

The derby, originally scheduled for a two-day, 42-mile grind, was shortened to one day and 21 miles. A heavy snowstorm compelled postponement of Saturday's race.

Thirteen-year-old Chester Allen of Huntville took third place, beating a number of seasoned veterans.
