

SILVERTON HIGH HOLDS LEAD IN VALLEY LEAGUE

Silverton—Silverton moved into the leadership of the Willamette inter-scholastic league by defeating Chemawa 39 to 21 last Friday night. This was Chemawa's first league defeat and her second defeat of the season.

As a result of last week's game it looks now as though there will be a three cornered fight for third place between West Linn, Molalla, and Lebanon. West Linn, by winning over Woodburn, kept its position in third place, but lost a little in the percentage column by losing to Lebanon. Lebanon's victory over West Linn came as an upset and now Clark's men are in a position to challenge those of Harting at Molalla for fourth place. Molalla by a victory over the luckless men from Woodburn strengthened their hold on fourth place and in turn are now challenging Coach Brown's cohorts at West Linn.

Next week-end finds Silverton playing West Linn at West Linn and Molalla playing Chemawa at Chemawa. Unless there is a real spilling of the old dope cart Silverton and Chemawa should emerge victorious. Lebanon plays Woodburn, who is holding down the cellar position, at Woodburn and should win. If all comes out as predicted Lebanon and West Linn will be tied for third place with Molalla in the fifth position.

OFFENSIVE GAME BEST DECLARES COACH WARNER

Philadelphia, Feb. 1 (AP)—When defense becomes more important on the gridiron than offense, Glenn Scooby (Pop) Warner, father of wingback football, wants to quit coaching.

"I believe, with most of the coaches in America today," he told an array of sports stars and fans at the Philadelphia sports writers' annual dinner, "that the science of football is concentrated in offense."

"Defense has caught up with offense, but in my estimation, offense is the soul of football. When it comes to the point where defense has passed offense, I want to quit coaching. But I don't think that time has come as yet."

Sidestepping the question of who his assistants are to be when he takes over the coaching reins at Temple university this spring, the "old dog," who resigned the coaching post at Stanford university, reiterated his position on a number of rule changes he proposes to sponsor at a meeting of coaches in New York Saturday.

"My suggestion to the rules committee," he said, "that a point be awarded for each first down had the emphasis of offense as its primary consideration."

"Bringing the goal posts back into the game. This would encourage more attempts at kicking field goals and I favor anything that will bring back that element of offense into strong prominence."

Warner said that allowing a point for each first down would, to a large extent, take the luck out of the first scores.

"The way I look at things," he added, "there is not enough stress placed on rushing the ball. Too much emphasis is given to kicking and passing. One of the changes I would suggest would be to limit the line of defense to six men."

COCHRAN LEADING BILLIARD FIELD

Chicago, Feb. 1 (AP)—Weiker Cochran of 182 balkin fame led the field in the stretch run of the 1933 world's three cushion billiard championship today but Johnny Layton, the flaming red head from Sedalia, Mo., was just starting one of his great dashes.

Layton, all but out of the race with two early defeats, rushed back into title contention, pushed back into the lead by defeating young Jay Bozeman of Vallejo, Cal., in one of the most dramatic duels of the tournament, 59 to 49 in 54 innings. The victory sent Layton ahead ahead of Bozeman with a record of six conquests and two set-backs and right behind the fast flying Cochran, who defeated Augie Kieckhefer of Chicago, the dethroned champion, in a matinee battle 60 to 23 in 36 innings.

Bozeman, whose play has been one of the surprising features of the championship battle that started January 16, was still in the fight, however, with five victories and two defeats. Each of the three leaders must play nine games before the final Friday night.

New York, Feb. 1 (AP)—There was a time when Babe Ruth thought he would be quite happy to round out two full decades in major league baseball and then retire to the bench or grandstand, occupying a sort of "emeritus chair" in the national game. He's changed his mind.

The year 1933 will mark his 20th campaign in the American league, for which he is already well prepared, even though unsigned. He has not the slightest idea of making it a farewell tour.

"Say, I couldn't even think of quitting baseball, the way I feel now," the Babe told me. "It's not only money I can make out of it. I wouldn't know what to do with myself if I was out of the game. I ought to be able to play regularly at least two or three years more."

Displaying just as many sharp elbows as the champion, Ray Lynes defeated Henry Jones in the main event of Tuesday night's wrestling exhibition at the armory. An old wound was re-opened over Jones' eye during the second round and the champion was unable to return to the mat for the third fall. Jones came back to even the match in 6:10 with his whip wristlock but a crack over the eye made any further wrestling for the evening impossible.
