NOTICE OF CIVIL SERVICE EXAMINATION FOR POLICEMEN AND POLICE MATRON. Notice is hereby given that the Civil Service Commission of the City of Salem, Oregon, will hold a competitive examination for the positions of policemen and police matron to fill vacancies which may occur, which examination will be held February 4, 1933, at 10 o'clock a.m., at the City Hall in Salem, Oregon. Said examination will cover the subjects of geography of the city, law of arrest, and other subjects and tests, including (except as to police matron) marksmanship, which will determine the capacity of applicants to perform the duties of the said respective positions, and which will include tests to determine physical fitness. Applicants for police matron will also be examined on questions pertaining to juvenile delinquency. No previous police experience necessary, but applicants having had such experience, if satisfactory, will be given credit therefor. Age limits: 35 years to 50 years of age for police matron, and 27 years to 40 years for policeman; honorably discharged war veterans may add to their age the period of military service. Pay of policeman, \$1350 per annum; of police matron, \$1185 per annum. Persons desiring to take the examination must file their application with the secretary and chief examiner at the City Hall, Salem, Oregon, not later than 5 p.m., January 30, 1933. Application blanks may be obtained at the office of the chief examiner.

of views they had last week. In connection with his declaration that the Washington meeting will not be a "swapping deal" Mr. Chamberlain said:

"The conception of concessions by Great Britain in return for the scaling down of war debts is not a British conception. 'The British view is that these obligations are not those of an ordinary debtor and creditor, but that adjustment is as much in the interest of the creditor nation as of the debtor.'"

The agreements achieved at the Imperial economic conference in Ottawa last summer "cannot be torn up," he said, and the British government's hands are tied by those agreements, of which they affect any arrangements with the United States at Washington.

As for a suggestion that the projected world economic conference tentatively scheduled for London be shifted to Washington, he pointed out that the meeting was called by the league of nations but that if responsible representations were made he believed they would be given consideration.

His outspoken utterances on the debts and the gold standard were drawn from him by the correspondents. The answers he gave were much more detailed and frank than a cabinet minister usually gives to questioners in the house.

He began by saying he didn't intend to discuss the debts because reports from the United States said America was "sick and tired of the whole business."

had previous to 1929. We are just recovering from that period."

"We had been going along fairly well until now because false prophets had been telling us in previous years that the world was coming to a crisis. The public mind was taken off the real issue by scores of proposed fake remedies. That was not the case this time, until technocracy came along. It was new. Its name was mysterious. It seemed to be the last great product of universal learning. It took the world by surprise much as poison gas did during the war. But I see that now a gas mask has been invented and technocracy is out—except as a thing to talk about."

"Technocracy is just a moving picture label for an old story that failed to interest when it was first exploited. In brief, it is a dictatorship by college professors. They have no right to the name because there is scarcely a technical man amongst them. And even if they were all of them technicians, the world is so constructed that only life can control it."

"The best that technocracy can do is to serve life. It cannot control it."

"Our mistake right along has been to allow dead things—money, machinery, materials—to dominate the living things."

"There is no profit whatever in living except the profit of life, and we haven't been taking the profit. We are being forced to now."

Ford turned abruptly to the discussion of machinery and its place in the present and future.

"Machinery will go just as soon as men want to resume their life. It will remain just as long as men prefer a general margin of ease in their work and leisure to live. Machinery is the friend of all men. It enables him to earn more in less time and to have more at less cost than anything the world has ever known. It has multiplied employment and income many times over."
