

WELFARE WORK MAIN SUBJECT OF COUNCILMEN

Silverton—Considering the welfare work of the city was the question discussed more at length than any other of importance at the regular meeting of the Silverton city council Monday evening. Street "stop" and "slow" signs, sidewalk repairs, insurance, city hall repairs, returning of dance license, and pronouncing of roller skating in the business section a real pest and menace, all came in for a minor share of discussion.

Hugh Range took the oath of office as the councilman appointed to fill the unexpired term of Mayor-elect Garver. Councilman Conrad explained that he would be away from the city for six months and that he wished to resign in favor of an appointee by the council. His request was deferred until the March meeting when a written resignation would be considered.

Concerning the placement of "slow" signs at a curve on McClaine street, and a "stop" sign at the junction of McClaine street and West Main on the Sun road, were left in the hands of the street committee with power to act.

A refund of one-half of the dance license fund to the O. N. G. company, Inc. was ordered.

A number of bad sidewalks were cited as a menace to the safety of pedestrians. The owners of the adjoining property will be officially notified, and steps taken for rebuilding the walks. This was also left to the members of the street committee.

A preparation of bond has been placed on the outer walls of the city hall for protection against the weather. This work was approved. No legal action was assumed in regard to the danger of children on roller skates being run down by cars in the busy sections of town, or on the sidewalks, a nuisance to pedestrians, but plenty of adverse sentiment was expressed with some action on the part of those in authority deemed necessary in extreme cases.

Mayor Garver, as chairman of the welfare board for local relief work, proposed a plan of appointing a committee from the members of the council to arrange for the use of vacant city lots for gardening by those who are receiving aid, and give them a respectable chance to help themselves. Councilman McGinnis presented a plan that included a summer camp with cabins where the unemployed may cut wood and help prepare the limbs of trees already cut, for saleable wood. This would be sold in cities away from Silverton so as not to interfere with local trade, was suggested. The plan could easily provide for a self-sustaining proposition, and would provide a sum by which the welfare work could be re-imbursement.

The general sentiment was thumbs down on those who were able bodied and refused to work for a reasonable wage with which to purchase supplies from the good-will store.

The members of the council agreed to assist personally, with the welfare work that is becoming a real problem to the committee.
