

LIBERALIZING OF SPORTS CONSIDERED BY STATES

HORSE RACING, BOXING COME IN FOR REVISIONS

New York, Feb. 7 (AP)—An unprecedented wave of proposed legislation for liberalizing and stimulating certain types of sports, particularly horse racing and boxing, is sweeping the nation, a United Press survey disclosed today.

At least 14 states have bills pending or in preparation providing for pari-mutuel betting, legalizing or liberalizing boxing and wrestling and permitting horse and dog racing. Others plan repeal of blue laws.

These measures reflect (1) diminishing prejudice against these sports, a trend apparently continuing with the more liberal public view on the liquor question, and (2) the desire to obtain revenues for state treasuries.

Measures permitting pari-mutuel betting will be considered by 10 state legislatures in 1933, and 11 states will take up measures dealing with boxing. Some legislatures will consider both.

Only two states were found preparing measures which would curtail professional sports. Oklahoma will consider a bill designed to ban wrestling, and California has a bill which would prohibit dog racing at night. A bill in Nebraska would limit the salary of the head football coach at the state university to \$4,000.

Five states—Colorado, Illinois, Ohio, Pennsylvania and Wisconsin—will consider measures providing for 15-round boxing contests. Most of these measures result from the difficulty of holding championship bouts at the shorter 10-round distance.

The Illinois bill carries an emergency clause which would permit immediate signing by the governor as a means of inducing Jack Dempsey to bring the Max Schmeling-Vax Baer fight to Chicago during the world fair.

Senate Votes To Keep Syndicalism Act On Oregon Statute Books

Twenty-two of the 30 members of the state senate Monday voted in favor of retaining the act against criminal syndicalism on the Oregon statute books. Thereby they indefinitely postponed and killed a bill introduced by Senator Peter Zimmerman for repeal of that act which was passed in 1921.

The contest, which was the only business of the afternoon in the senate, lasting from 2 until nearly 5 o'clock, was over a divided report of the judiciary committee. A majority of the committee recommended that the repeal bill pass and a minority that it not pass.

Substitution of the minority for the majority was by a vote of 22 to 8 and then a roll call was asked for by Senator Zimmerman on a motion by Duncan that the bill be indefinitely postponed. Several senators who had voted for the majority report, including Senator Upton, one of the three signers of the majority report, spoke in this only a gesture, as Upton expressed it, and voted for Duncan's motion, making the final vote 26 to 4.

The vote on the question of substituting the minority report, which was the actual vote on the question of repeal, was as follows:

In the second roll call Hazlett, Hess, Upton and Spaulding voted to indefinitely postpone.

The majority report was signed by Senator Upton, chairman of the committee, and Senators Dickson and Hazlett. The minority report was signed by Senators Duncan and Goss.

Duncan, moving substitution of the minority for the majority report, which would mean the death of the repeal bill by indefinite postponement, proceeded to speak on his motion, and began by reading the criminal syndicalism act which, when it was passed a dozen years ago, was directed against violence in industrial controversy, sabotage, the fomenting of revolution and similar offenses.

Duncan reminded the senate that there had been only two prosecutions under the act, one of which was appealed to the supreme court and reversed, hence, he argued, the act had never been abused. Referring to the Ben Boloff case, he conceded that it should not have been prosecuted. The existing law, he said, was only an enactment into law of an American principle. He denied that it interfered with the freedom of speech or the press. The law should be retained, he asserted, as a protection against those societies that defy the laws of the state or the government.

"The attempt at repeal at this time," he said, "is ill-advised. Senator Zimmerman led the debate for the majority report. Referring to the American legion, which opposed the repeal, he declared that "I have nothing against that organization whatever. In fact, in times past I have gone out and fought for the things that the legion was trying to achieve. The question is before us whether the government should continue to exist for the benefit of the people." Zimmerman professed to see among those opposed to the repeal an element that wished "to be made martyrs by its continued existence. That reason alone is sufficient for its repeal."

Zimmerman quoted Thomas Jefferson as saying "I hope that this country may have a revolution every 20 years," in order that a bloody revolution may be averted. "I am going to amend that," said Zimmerman, "by saying that I hope we may have a revolution every four years, and have it at the ballot box." "The rebellious spirit that we have in our country today," he said, "is because our people have not had opportunity by honest effort to go out and make an honest living. When the people find themselves in a condition of slavery as real as the black man ever experienced, and lashed with a whip more bitter than any literal lash that was ever wielded by the slave master with his black-skin, then the people have a right to overthrow their government for a system more just and satisfactory. This law dates to throw men behind the penitentiary bars for no reason but expressing their opinions."

Sensor Zimmerman said that the farmers were accused of seeking special privilege in asking for passage of Prazier bill in congress whereby the farmers' debts would be refunded at 1 1/2 per cent interest, but that the big steamship companies are not accused of special privilege when they get a rate that is only a fifth of that asked by the farmers." Referring to the threat of Iowa farmers to blow up the state capitol unless they got relief Zimmerman said that "under the vicious law that we now have every one of those farmers could be sent to the state penitentiary."

Referring to the constitutionality of the act, Senator Dickson said he considered it a clear invasion of the rights of American citizens. "I hold no brief," he said, "for those people known as communists, reds, or what not, except that I contend they have a right to peacefully assemble for a declaration of their principles." Dickson said he believed the press of the state generally favors repeal of the act and that they express the opinion of a majority of the people. He read editorials in support of this statement. He declared there are other laws under which procedure can be taken against persons guilty of over acts against government. He defended deportation when necessary.
