COUNCIL VOTES LIQUOR REPEAL OF ORDINANCES

Mt. Angel—The city council held its regular monthly meeting Monday evening at 7:30 o'clock with all members present. A communication from Mrs. Von Tersch offering to deed the property to the city for delinquent assessments was read, and also a communication from the state board of health giving prices on wood sewer pipe was read.

The city recorder and treasurer's books were checked by the finance committee, according to the report of Young, chairman of that committee. Hasting reported that he had inspected the tile across Main street and stated that it was impossible to clean this pipe at present. A report on the mayor's and recorder's visit to the state board of health in the interest of the sewer suit was made.

It was moved and seconded that the city recorder see Mr. Ross and have the necessary papers drawn to have the F. A. Meyer property sold and take up the matter of the Von Tersch and Schuch properties. A bill for an ordinance to repeal all of the ordinances numbers 10, 13, 27, 32, 57 and 74 of the city of Mt. Angel pertaining to the licensing and regulation of saloons selling intoxicating beverages in the city of Mt. Angel and declaring an emergency was read. This ordinance was read three times and upon the third and final reading the mayor ordered that it be placed upon the final passage by roll call. The bill was unanimously passed and it was given permanent number 206.

The recorder made a report that he had checked up with the recorder of Silverton regarding the wholesale trade vehicle license and found that they reported the enforcement of this order impractical. Upon the presentation of the list of delinquent water rent by Recorder Smith, it was moved and seconded that water users who found it absolutely impossible to pay their water bills should make application in writing for relief during the present depression, otherwise delinquent water users would have their water shut off. The street committee was instructed to repair the street near the crematory. The bills of the month were presented and upon approval of the finance committee were ordered to be paid.
