

13 LOSE LIVES WHEN ALASKAN VESSEL SINKS

Dutch Harbor, Alaska, Feb. 13 (AP)—Thirteen persons, among them Bishop Antonin, ranking bishop of the Russian Orthodox church in Alaska, lost their lives, related reports received here last night said. In a terrific mid-winter storm in which the small vessel Umnak Native was sunk in the Aleutians three weeks ago.

The small 50-foot vessel went down in a gale near Umnak island on January 24, the message said, and only three of its passengers and crew list of 16 were saved. They were natives, two from Umnak and one from Unalaska.

Among the others aboard who perished were Capt. Andrew Nelson, former skipper of the small motorship Bunick, the master, Captain Stankus, his wife and their infant child, and a Russian priest at Umnak, Mike Tutlakos.

A severe storm swept the Aleutians at that time, shipping men here today recalled, and as Umnak island is between 50 and 75 miles west of here, its fury was undoubtedly equally severe in the region of the island, they pointed out.

The small wooden vessel, of only 47 tons capacity, was making a trip between trading posts, the reports received here said, as its cargo included 100 blue fox pups. It was owned by the Umnak village community, on the island.

Bishop Antonin came north from Vancouver, B. C., two years ago, members of the church here recalled, and had headquarters at Sitka but made frequent trips among the churches over the territory. During the world war he had served as a chaplain with the Russian forces.

During the mid-winter, communications among the Aleutian islands are infrequent, which explained the delay in receiving word of the disaster here.

Seattle, Feb. 13 (AP)—Bishop Antonin, who was lost when a vessel went down in the Aleutians three weeks ago, members of the Russian Orthodox church here said, was the ranking bishop of that faith in Alaska. With headquarters at Sitka, Alaska, he went north from Vancouver, B. C., two years ago, they said.

Grand Jury System Archaic Says Goss

Senator Goss' joint resolution which would submit to the people a proposed constitutional amendment whereby it would be optional whether crime cases be tried on grand jury indictment or on information was adopted by the senate Saturday.

Senator Goss termed the grand jury system "archaic, cumbersome, slow and expensive," and declared the optional system has come into favor throughout the country.

"In states that have the optional system," he said, "the grand jury is rarely resorted to. Wisconsin hasn't had a grand jury investigation in 40 years."

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NON-PARTISAN ELECTION BILL PUT IN SENATE

From a second source comes legislative fire with the Oregon election system as the target. This was a group of four bills introduced by Senator Zimmerman that would make the election non-partisan. They provide, in brief, that the voter at any primary election shall not be limited to voting for a candidate of his own party affiliation, also providing that a person registered as an independent may vote in the primaries.

Instead of the present system whereby the voter is given, upon entering the polling place, a ballot containing only the names of candidates of one party, seeking the office nomination of that party, the voter, under the Zimmerman bills, would receive a ballot containing the names of candidates of all the parties. Their object is what is known as the "open primary" system.

The two candidates receiving the highest vote would be nominated, regardless of party affiliation. Two republicans or two democrats, for example, might be opponents for an office in the November election.

Zimmerman said the bill had the approval of the grange, the Farmers Union, the State Federation of Labor and the Housewives' council of Portland.

The object of the Zimmerman bills is diametrically opposed to that of the bill to change the election code introduced Friday by Senator By-

non. It was devised by a group of democrats and republicans centering about W. S. U'Ren, known as the father of the Oregon primary system, and is intended to make party identity more definite than at present.

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MARION COUNTY POMONA GRANGE PLANS CAMPAIGN

Silverton—Among topics discussed before more than 75 people who attended the all-day meeting at the K. of P. hall of the agricultural committee of the Pomona grange were the establishing of a cooperative fuel station, control of rodents, the school director bill before the legislature, discrimination of rates as regards fire hazard taxes as related to timber holdings and small farms, and concerning the advisability of allowing advertising of other than butter products in the grange bulletin.

Ray J. Glatt of Woodburn was elected chairman of the organization for the year, and Karl Haberly of Waldo Hills was made secretary. The next meeting will be the second Wednesday in April.

Favor was expressed by the group for establishing a farmers' bulk oil and gas distributing station in Marion county, with financial plans formulated for the carrying on of the plan.

S. J. Van Trump led discussion of rodent control, recommended the free distribution of poison barley for squirrels and strychnine for gophers. He introduced a resolution which was adopted, for the drafting of five able bodied men for the work of preparing the material.

The report on the fire hazard tax question was presented by J. F. Richards of Slayton, with the result that L. S. Lambert of Slayton, Mrs. Anna Hadley of Silverton Hills and Mr. Richards were appointed by the chair as a committee to formulate a resolution concerning a disapproval in the discrimination in fire hazard taxes. This was adopted.

John Tschantz of the Silverton Hills grange spoke in no uncertain terms against any coconut advertising being allowed in the bulletin. A motion was passed to stand against such advertisements in the official grange organ.

Quakes Serious In Province of Kansu

Felping, Feb. 13 (AP)—Official reports said today that 250 persons were killed and 300 seriously injured last December by earthquakes in northwest Kansu province.

(This section of Kansu, a mountainous province at the northwest extremity of China proper, extends into Mongolia north of Tibet.) Reports that much greater numbers were killed were discredited by the Chinese international famine relief commission.

Eight hundred homes were destroyed by the shocks and seven districts were affected. The quakes were reported to have lasted an hour and a half.
