

STRONG TILLAMOOK TEAM PLAYS SALEM TUESDAY

SALEM ANXIOUS TO EVEN EARLY SEASON DEFEAT

Tillamook high's hoop squad, bound straight for the state tournament, barring an unprecedented upset, which has not been defeated in its class this season and which holds two victories over Astoria in addition to a 34 to 32 win over Salem, will come here for a return engagement with Coach Hollis Huntington's crew Tuesday night. Revenge for the early season defeat is possible, Salem's backers believe, and a strong effort will be made to reverse the count.

Despite a 34 to 25 setback at the hands of Oregon State rooks Saturday afternoon, Salem is favored to check in a win over the Cheesemakers since the red and black will have the advantage of playing on their home floor. The floor work of Coach Huntington's men has improved a great deal in recent games. More consistency in scoring is an essential requirement at this time. Tillamook high, coached by Russ Barry, has some heavyweights in the lineup this year who are adapting themselves to the court game without much difficulty. Friday night they turned in their second win of the season over Astoria, winning on the home floor, 28 to 23. A preliminary between the "B" team and one of the Church league squads will get under way at 7 o'clock.

OUT OF BOUNDS FOOTBALL PLAY SENT TO DISCARD

Philadelphia, Feb. 13 (AP)—The national football rules committee has completed its annual study of the playing code and adopted only two changes in the regulations for 1938.

Out of their three-day gathering at Green Hill Farms, just outside Philadelphia, the members came forth with these alterations: First—Elimination of the sideline play through a new zoning system.

Second—A tightening of the restrictions against clipping so that this practice virtually is legislated out of the game.

Of the two alterations made in the rules, the more radical was that designed to eliminate the sideline play, bane of teams marching goalward who find themselves obliged to waste a down to bring the ball into better position.

To prevent this, the rules committee decided to establish side zones, ten yards in width, on either side of the field. Whenever the ball becomes dead within these zones, it will be moved to a point ten yards in from the side line, without time out being called. At the same time, the committee decided that when the ball goes out of bounds it shall be brought in ten yards from the side line instead of 15 yards as heretofore.

The rule against clipping was altered to make it illegal for a player to run into the back of an opponent not carrying the ball, adding to the previous rule against throwing or dropping the body across the back of the leg or legs of the opponent below the knee. In the interests of stricter enforcement of the rule, the penalty was reduced from 25 yards to 15, after committee members had pointed out that the heavier penalty led some officials to hesitate about calling it.

Boys From Training School Trade Blows
Hubbard—Eight bouts of boxing was the card presented by boys from the state training school under the direction of Officer Cliff Weaver. The program was prepared under the direction of Superintendent Sam Laughlin and was given at the annual stag given by the McMinnville Elks in honor of the American Legion members of various towns near McMinnville. Officer Charles Knowland of the school was master of ceremonies.

An innovation which proved more than popular judging by the enthusiastic applause was the appearance of the Salem Peppers under the direction of Franklin de Lespinasse. The musical program was prepared by Dr. A. F. de Lespinasse of the state training school. Novelty numbers featuring the members of the seven piece orchestra drew thundering applause from the packed hall. Appearing with the Peppers were Caravaty, a student at the school, and Weaver, both men giving their dances with orchestral accompaniment. As a solo number Miss Troupel of Estacada gave a trumpet selection.

The program opened with an orchestral selection, Yankee Doodle Doll, after which Sam Laughlin was introduced by the presiding officer of the Elks. Laughlin presented Father Rubbs of Woodburn, who spoke briefly on the need of understanding between fathers and sons. Local folk with the Salem Peppers were Marie de Lespinasse and Louise Grimps, the former clarinet soloist, the latter saxophone soloist. Mrs. Laughlin and others from the school accompanied the superintendent and the boxers to McMinnville.

CHEMAWA WINS
Woodburn—The Chemawa Indian school team checked in two victories over Woodburn high here Friday night. The Indian first basketball team won, 35 to 22, in a rough encounter while the "B" squad from Chemawa defeated the second Bulldog quint by approximately the same score. Woodburn will play its last game of the season at Silverton next Friday night.

Just one short year ago the "wild horse of the Osage," fresh from a vaudeville tour and with the echoes of world series cheers still ringing in his ears, was a personage of the diamond.

A year ago every move of Pepper Martin, the world series hero, was hot news. Today he faces a real fight to hold his job.

Sports writers speculated on what further deeds of derring-do this doughty Oklahoman might achieve. His physical condition was a subject of discussion. His departure for training camp was an event, his arrival another. His birthday anniversary was fittingly observed.

This year, thanks to a two year contract signed after his personal triumph over the Athletics, he still is on the Cardinal roster without a pay reduction—a distinction to set him apart, surely.

But Manager Gabby Street doesn't know where "Pepper" is going to play on his ball team, or whether he's going to play at all. Ernie Orsatti and George Watkins have first call on two garden berths with the 1933 Redbirds. Joe Medwick, Texas league recruit, is favored by Street for the other.

Gabby is "still considering" Martin, he said, for a trial at third base. However, this depends on the showing of the "experienced infielders," who include Frank Frisch, Rogers Hornsby and Spaky Adams, and possibly Charley Gelbert, should the latter's leg heal completely from a gunshot wound.

Pepper, in Gabby's phrase, will have to "beat his way back." There are plenty of fans and not a few experts, though, who believe he can do that very thing.

TURNER WILL FACE MILL CITY QUINT

Turner—The championship of the southern division of the Mid-Willamette Valley basketball league which was apparently sewed up by Turner in their victory over Scio, is disputed by Mill City according to word received here, with the possibility of a tie between these teams in event Mill City wins Thursday night. Mill City has lost but one game this season, to Turner, and while Turner has won all of its games, dropping the forthcoming game means a tie between the two teams. While no dispute over referees has arisen so far this season, it is understood Mill City is demanding an outside referee for this contest. Nury of Stayton and Adams of Salem have been mentioned as possible officials.

Interest in basketball has again mounted since these developments have come to light and a record crowd is expected to attend. The advance dope is that Turner should not find too much difficulty in defeating this team, though it is reported that Mill City has strengthened its team since its defeat by Turner early in the season. While Turner won by a considerable margin, they have not been consistent in running up large scores, having won three contests by margins of one, two and three points. However, they have a total of 589 points to 512 for the opponents. Parkers of Salem will in all probability be one of the representatives in the tournament to be held later, with the winner of the Polk county league, and either Turner or Mill City.

Seattle, Feb. 13 (AP)—A costly win over Washington State, 32 to 30, in which acting Captain Johnny Fuller of Washington received a broken ankle, put the Husky basketball team within striking distance today of the league-leading Oregon State five, but Oregon State has the chance to move still further out in front tonight and tomorrow night.

Fouled by Huntley Gordon, Washington State center, in the closing two minutes of play Saturday night, Fuller fell to the floor. At first his injuries were called a dislocated knee and sprained ankle, but an X-ray last night showed his ankle was broken.

Out of the two free tosses, however, Frank McCartney a substitute, dropped in one to tie the score at 30-all, and Jack Hanover's basket 30 seconds before the gun went off won the game.

Little daunted, however, although the task of winning all their remaining six games, two against Washington State at Pullman on Friday and Saturday nights, in order to be assured of a tie for the northern division title with Oregon State, has now become much harder, the Huskies resumed practice today.
