## LIONS HEAR ABOUT VALENTINE HISTORY

Monmouth—The Lions club at its noon meeting this week found their plates marked with place cards, folded comic valentines, appropriately selected.

A short talk about valentine customs was made by R. B. Svenson developing the fact that the valentine day custom was copied from the English and they from the early Roman Christians who adopted it from the pagans, who in turn took it from nature, early spring being the mating time of birds. The Roman youth were accustomed to draw tablets from an urn. On each tablet was the name of a maiden, and the young man was expected to give preference for a year to the maiden thus selected. A year's companionship often resulted in matrimony. Hence the blind cherub and his arrows. Valentine was a bishop of the early church, martyred by the emperor Claudius in the year 270. He was canonized and given a day which happened to come close to the day of the drawing from the urn. Hence the two dates were merged in one.
