

ABBOTT TAKES LIFE BY RIFLE; SHOT IN HEART

Woodburn—Ray Abbott, 53, committed suicide about 2 o'clock Sunday morning by shooting himself with a high powered hunting rifle at his home at 1205 Harcourt avenue. His wife and daughter were in bed at the time and immediately ran to neighbors for help and called Dr. Gerald Smith. Abbott was unconscious when the doctor arrived and died shortly after.

Abbott had placed an ice pick in the trigger of the gun and by pulling the gun towards him discharged it, the bullet passing through the heart and out the right shoulder. He had been dependent and worried over money matters for some time and left a note for his family intimating that financial worries were the cause of the act. Dr. Smith immediately notified Coroner Barrington who ordered the body removed to the Hall mortuary without further investigation.

Abbott was born in Iowa in August, 1879, and was married 32 years ago to Besie Ekins, who survives him. He was a newspaper man and owned and edited a paper at Ellensburg, Wash., for some time and was formerly of the Keystone Press at Portland. The family came from Silvertown two and a half years ago. While in Silvertown Abbott conducted the Club pool hall. He has been employed in printing offices at McMinnville, White Salmon, Wash., and Woodburn.

Besie's widow, he leaves three daughters, Mrs. Larry Mettenen of Multnomah, Mrs. Edna McClary of Silvertown and Ellen of Woodburn, and one son, John, of Portland, and one grandchild.

It was Abbott's wish that there be no funeral services or flowers and that his body be cremated. Final arrangements have not been completed but his wishes will be carried out at the Portland Crematorium.

He was a member of the Modern Woodmen at Silvertown and the Typographical union of Portland.

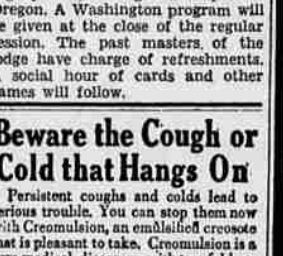
