

## FLAX GROWING AT SILVERTON HAS INTEREST

Silverton—Of chief importance among the discussions by the Silverton grange members at their meeting in the M. W. A. hall, was the question of the growing of flax for the Portland mills. Otto Dahl, head of the agricultural committee, and his associate committee men had made investigations along this line and were able to give constructive reports.

Those interested planned on growing the flax for the seed crop. They were told that they could purchase the seed for three cents per pound, and that 40 pounds are required to seed an acre. That the average production of the seed is 10 bushels to the acre and that the average price is around \$1.25 per bushel. Several farmers will try the experiment this year. Distribution will be handled through the agricultural committee with George Torselson of the Warehouse Service Corporation in charge. Mr. Torselson will be available for more information on this movement if the farmers desire it.
