FREDDIE MILLER LAYS CLAIM TO BOXING TITLE

Los Angeles, March 1 (AP)—The National Boxing association feather-weight crown rested securely on the head of Freddie Miller today after he easily repulsed Alberto "Baby" Arizmendi, outstanding challenger from Mexico City.

Miller's first defense of his recently acquired title was climaxed with a gallery shower of bottles, fruits, peanuts and programs. This barrage from Mexican partisans was delivered with somewhat more effectiveness than the sensational rushes of Arizmendi, which seldom disturbed the cool-headed southpaw. Nine thousand persons in the Olympic auditorium last night watched the 21-year-old Cincinnati sharpshooter build up a wide margin in the early rounds as he kept the sturdy Aztec at long range with a jabbing right hand. Miller had a few uneasy moments in the late rounds as the baby faced challenger flailed the champion with rights and lefts in desperate attempts to save the fight. In one of these outbursts Arizmendi sent the champion reeling to the ropes in the seventh round. But the titleholder shook him off and was pressing the battle as the final gong sounded.

Without hesitation Referee Harry Lee raised Miller's hand and the institutions of higher learning. The fight from the gallery started. As fighters, referee and ringsiders dodged missiles, police hurriedly cleared the house. An unidentified ringsider suffered a severe scalp wound from the aerial attack. The galleries' assault was apparently in protest against Arizmendi's inability to cope with the champion.

Miller weighed 125 pounds and Arizmendi 125 1/2.

Finance Committee Refuses Concessions To Schools And Fairs

The ways and means committee last night refused to make any concessions to the state board of higher education, and stood by its previous closely-cropped appropriation for the institutions of higher learning.

The committee successfully resisted efforts to force appropriations for the Oregon state fair and the Pacific International Livestock exposition. The best it would do towards purchase of the military training grounds at Camp Clatsop was to report out without recommendation a bill for a \$30,000 authorization. It indefinitely postponed four bills to bring the corporation and insurance departments and two subsidiary divisions of the latter under budget control. Favorable recommendation was voted for the "tithing" bill, with the highway department left out, and the Corbett bill relieving counties of the expense of caring for non-violent insane.

On motion of Representative Dean Walker the committee voted to put in a bill setting aside an emergency fund of \$150,000 for any activities that may get into distress by virtue of the severe cut made in appropriations.

It was a long evening devoted to reviewing the work of the last 30 days, correcting a few minor items, and discussing but refusing changes in major ones.

The fight for a concession to higher education was started by Representative Walker when Representative Gordon moved that a bill be drawn diverting from the higher education millage tax estimate of over \$3,900,000 the sum of \$508,000 for the general state fund. Walker made a fight to have this diversion reduced to \$350,000, basing his argument on three points. The first was that the salary reduction schedule had been modified since approval of the education appropriation, with injustice, he believed, to the institutions. The second point was that due to decreased assessed property valuations the institutions of learning would lose about \$183,000. His third reason was that with the probable passage of a sales tax property taxes will be removed sufficient to lose the institutions another \$250,000.

Walker claimed his figures were based on estimates given him by the state tax commission. Representative Carle Abrams countered by offering figures which, he said, came from the tax commission showing that the educational institutions would not suffer at all. Gordon's motion to divert \$508,000 carried after the committee had voted down Walker's amendment.

Voting with Walker were Senators Staples and Dunn and Representatives Dammasch and Hill. For the Gordon motion were Senators Jones, Strayer, Woodward and Wheeler and Representatives Gordon, Snider and Allen.

Seeking to save the state fair and the Pacific International Livestock Exposition from a total cut, Representative Abrams read a sub-committee report, signed also by Gordon and Dammasch, recommending a \$37,500 appropriation for each show, or a 50 per cent cut as compared with previous sessions.

This brought an ultimatum from Senator Hess. He declared that if this were done he would have to ask an appropriation for the Eastern Oregon Livestock Show at Union, since it was on an identical basis with the other two, though the appropriation, since his constituents were not asking it.

Walker opposed the appropriations, declaring it would "ridiculously" back up. Senator Woodward urged the committee to stand by its previous actions regardless of pressure.

"Here is what we are up against and what we have to resist," said Woodward. "O. M. Plummer, manager of the Pacific International, made a trip to my apartment and pleaded for this appropriation. Paul Kelly, editor of the Oregonian, called me by telephone and wanted to know if I wanted it to be said of me that I was the one man who wrecked higher education in Oregon. Gentlemen, let's stick together on what we have done, for it has been done with care and deliberation. The governor removed these fair appropriations from the budget. Now they tell us that he is willing to have them put back, and that he will sign the bills. My reply was 'Can't he send us a letter over his signature, saying that they were left out erroneously? But no, he won't do that. Gentlemen, he's putting us over a barrel. Let's stick it.'

Senator Dunn moved indefinite postponement of the matter. Staples resisted this, declaring that "it is a shame to cut out the fairs. Multnomah county pays 64 per cent of the state's taxes and hasn't asked for a thing in return. The money for these fairs isn't a loss, for it doesn't go out of the state."

Senator Dunn said Staples would "put bulls above brains. How," he asked, "can we appropriate when there isn't any money. We have a better fair at Medford than the Pacific International and we aren't asking for anything. Why, I visited the Pacific International and was ashamed of it. There wasn't anything to be seen but a few jumping horses."

Representative Snider, who is vice-president of the Oregon Cattle and Horse Raisers' association, said his organization felt the cuts worse than anyone else, but wasn't asking for the money.

Abrams made an extended plea for the fairs, declaring a "great wrong has been done, and we ought to act like men and correct it."

The main argument for the Camp Clatsop purchase appropriation was that the bill would be an evidence of good faith, that the state intended to exercise its option to buy the grounds so the government would complete the buildings during the next two years at a cost of \$150,000. Otherwise, said Senator Francisovich who appeared for the bill, the government would not act. The measure does not ask a direct appropriation, but would authorize the state board of control to purchase whenever the funds were available.

ONE HURDY-GURDY

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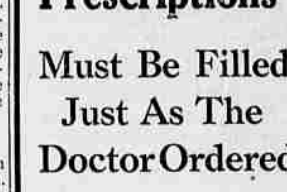
