

PARKING SPACE TAKES INTEREST OF COUNCILMEN

Silverton—Although a number of important matters occupied the city council at its regular session Monday night, most of the time was taken up in discussions concerning the closing of the former parking space at the entrance of the city park at the end of Coolidge street.

Cal Schlador made the objection to closing the space as this entrance is the only way out to the street from the residence properties of his mother and other members of the family. These property owners have used this entrance for 20 years and the closing would mean building a roadway across their own property. The argument for closing the space was to prevent accidents as the space is limited, and also to hinder driving through parts of the park limited to pedestrians. At the suggestion of Mayor Garver a motion was made by McGinnis to leave the affair in the hands of the park committee. This motion passed.

An investigation into the cause of the high price of lights at the city hall was ordered before the bill was paid. The December bill was warmly discussed at the last meeting because it has been more than was deemed reasonable. The January statement was practically the same. These, compared to bills of the corresponding months of previous years caused the order for investigation.

By action of the councilmen, the mayor and recorder were authorized to sign a lease in regard to the federal requirements of the local airport.

A refund of half the license to the American Legion on the dance given for Boy Scout benefit was ordered.

The resignation of Councilman J. F. Conrad was read and accepted. Conrad plans to be away from Silverton for a number of months. On motion of Reynolds, a letter of appreciation for his services as councilman will be written by Conrad to the recorder in behalf of the councilmen.

A resolution recommended by the finance committee concerning reduction of bonding requirements of the city treasurer was passed. This called for the \$50,000 bonding requirement to be reduced to \$20,000.

Upon motion by McGinnis, C. B. Anderson of Silverton was appointed to audit the books of the city treasurer and recorder. The bonding company requires an annual audit.

In reply to A. H. Smith's request for furnishing gravel on his property where water from the street washes out his private driveway, the matter was left in the hands of the street committee. This committee was also given the responsibility with power to act in making necessary repairs in the pavement of several places in the city limits.

Mayor Garver appointed a committee to investigate and report concerning the request for the water rent of certain county charges who were delinquent in their bills. The discussion disclosed that the county made provisions for payment of such bills in the allowance made these families. W. L. McGinnis was appointed chairman of the committee, to be assisted by Hugh Range and Mrs. Irma Le-Riche.

The appointment of a successor of Conrad was deferred until the April meeting of the council.

Dallas Records Reveal Municipality Near Its Sixtieth Anniversary

Dallas—According to the available existing records, civic government for this city began November 3, 1874. On that date a board of trustees, five in number, together with a recorder a marshal and a treasurer were appointed. One of the trustees was named as president to take charge of the meetings and to B. P. Nichols, a druggist, fell the honor of being the first president.

About one month later, on December 1, the board appointed N. L. Butler as city attorney, an office which he apparently held for five years when Daniel Gaby was appointed. Since the first day of civic government until the present time 180 men have served the city in various capacities. A new charter was granted in 1891 and again in 1901.

In December 1874, the board passed a street ordinance naming five streets running north and south and five running east and west. These streets were named, beginning in the east part and running north and south, Madison, Jefferson, Main, Church and Clay and those running east and west beginning in the north end, Academy, Oak, Mill, Court, Washington, Madison today is Shelton and Clay Levens.

In 1882 on April 18 the board gave the necessary authority to obtain the cost of procuring water for the use of the town but some two weeks later drowned upon the idea and it was burned down. Almost seven years later it was broached again but two more years elapsed before a water works ordinance was passed. On October 16, 1893 a special election for a \$14,000 bond issue went over by 141 votes to 94. It was not, however, until May 26, 1904 that a water works system was finally accepted by the city.

On April 2nd 1883 as the result of the presentation of a petition signed by a majority of the citizens steps were taken to secure fire fighting equipment which at that time consisted of a hand engine and 300 feet of two-inch hose.

The first sewer was installed in 1904. In 1909 the marshal was ordered to arrest the first person caught running his automobile faster than six miles per hour.

In 1884 the city acquired the camp ground now known as the city park. Hard paving was first introduced in 1913 when quite a few blocks were hard surfaced.
