

WASHINGTON LEGISLATORS COMPLETE JOB

State Capitol, Olympia, Wash., March 13 (AP)—The biennial Washington state legislature was history today following the adjournment Saturday night. The legislators retired to their respective homes following two months of bill passing in which every major measure of the democratic administration was passed.

The constitutional amendment limited legislation to last Thursday night. Clocks were stopped however, and legislators worked without pay until Saturday night.

Only three senators were present when the motion to adjourn was officially voted in the senate. A handful of representatives were present when the house adjourned.

The pilotage bill, which would have necessitated a pilot for every sea-going vessel entering Puget Sound, was tabled on a motion of Senator Charles Todd of King county. The bill was bitterly opposed by shipping men in Seattle.

Governor Clarence D. Martin, has many bills to sign. Among them is house bill 92, the occupational tax bill, and the chain store bill, which passed both houses in modified form. More than 100 more or less important bills await the governor's signature, making them law.

F. R. RECEIVES HEAPS OF MAIL

Washington, March 13 (AP)—Heaps of mail and telegrams and numerous telephone calls brought evidence to the White House today of the support President Roosevelt is receiving from the public in the banking emergency.

From every section of the country came suggestions for restoring confidence.

Pledges of support began last week when the holiday was first proclaimed and reached a peak last night after Mr. Roosevelt had made an appeal for confidence and courage.

A few minutes after the president concluded, the White House switchboard was deluged with telephone calls from all sections, each caller praising Mr. Roosevelt's outline of the problem. So great was the volume of calls it was impossible for the switchboard to handle them all.

State officials, business men, bankers and the plain citizen have sent thousands of telegrams to the chief executive asking what they can do to help. More than a dozen have written letters, offering to take their few pieces of gold treasures.

FRIENDS VISIT DENIED ADAMS

Daniel S. Adams of Salem, veteran of the civil war and father of Grace E. Hall, Portland author, celebrated his 81st birthday at his home here Saturday. It was an occasion for visits from many friends and comrades of the G. A. R. and Salem Daughters of Veterans presented him with a birthday cake.

Mr. Adams is vitally interested in all that is happening in the world and keeps abreast of current events. He was born at Casco bay, Maine, where he spent his boyhood days. In August, 1862, he boarded a train at Kewanee, Ill., for Camp Butler, near Springfield, as a volunteer in the civil war. He was 20 years old. Three years later, August 15, 1865, he was mustered out at Chicago.

Upon entering the service Mr. Adams was sent to Jackson, Tenn., with the 1st brigade, 3rd division, 17th army corps. He saw his first action in a campaign down the Tennessee river in Mississippi. Next he was on an invasion of Mississippi below Oxford on Yockney creek, where, for 13 days, he had nothing to eat but two ears of corn a day.

"That was one place where I was nearly frozen to death, starved to death and scared to death, all at the same time," he recalled. "We slept on the ground, and I awoke one morning and found it had rained in the night and I was frozen in a coating of thin ice."

Next came a march to Memphis, Tenn., followed by fighting at Port Gibson, Miss., Raymond, Miss., and Jackson, Miss. He took part in the famous engagement at Champion Hills on the march to Vicksburg. After 47 days at Vicksburg, his
