

LINN BRIDGE PROGRAM HIT THRU 'JOKER'

Albany—Linn county's secondary highway program, of which the important bridge over the Santiam river at the old Sanderson's bridge site is a part, received a death blow in the closing days of the 1933 legislature. It was revealed here yesterday when the county court members met with state engineers to map out a plan of procedure.

It developed that a joker, written into the secondary highway bill was jeopardized the construction of the bridge and placed an estoppel on secondary highway work that will cost Linn county taxpayers many thousands of dollars through loss of opportunity to employ heads of families now unemployed. As a result the state can only spend \$15,000 on secondary highways in Linn county this year.

The three secondary highways of this county are the Halsey-Sweet Home road, the eastside Albany-Corvallis highway and the Lakeview-Yonah road on which the new bridge is to be located. The whole matter of constructing the span across the Santiam river is now up in the air.

The state highway department had already agreed to appropriate about \$35,000 for this work this year on a basis of the county appropriating the remainder from its state and road bridge funds. The county court members were hopeful that "special arrangements" may be made in some way to obtain the operation of the state highway department in building the bridge this year.

High water washed away the Sanderson bridge last year, closing traffic to the community near Crabtree.
