

SILVERTON AND HUBBARD PASS BEER ORDINANCES

REGULATION OF BEVERAGE WILL BE ACTED UPON

Silverton—Silverton's proposed ordinance No. 257 and amendment to the city charter concerning the regulation of 3.2 per cent beer and intoxicating liquors passed unanimously the first and second readings before the city council at a special meeting last night and will be brought before the regular meeting for final passage Monday evening. A bonding ordinance also went through two readings.

Adverse criticism was voiced by J. E. Hosmer in an eloquent appeal for councilmen to put up a prohibition ordinance instead. Among other things, Hosmer stated: "Suppose all stimulants and narcotics, money spent for beer is not spent for bread. It is an opening wedge to the revival of a past evil—the open saloon. Crime entailed would eat up the revenue. Alcoholism is one of humanity's worst diseases. Let the people vote on it, warning of the evil effects."

Final adoption of the beer ordinance will permit dealers here to start selling beer under the prescribed restrictions when the time limit of April 7 is in force. The license would be \$10 semi-annual to sell both in original containers and for consumption in their place of business, and \$5 semi-annually for selling beer in unbroken original containers. July was the date discussed for payment of license fees.

A few restrictions enumerated were that no beverage be dispensed "over bars" with bars being listed as anything that resembled a counter. Tables were designated as the medium for mug placement at which the customer may be seated and drink. Places of business already provided with bars and rails are no exception and come under the table restriction. Minors are positively taboo, and all "brawls and fighting" are frowned upon.

Numerous visitors attended the meeting "just to listen in," they explained when extended the courtesy of free speech.

The bonding ordinance concerned the \$30,326.90 left unpaid of the bonds issued in 1932, due in 1933, and provided a rewording in which \$2500 may be paid each year from 1933 to March 1, 1947, with interest-bearing coupons attached.

Hubbard—At the called meeting of the city council it was decided to issue temporary permits to sell the recently legalized beer for \$1 to any local business place. No permits will be given to conduct the business of selling beer as a business but business men already established will be licensed temporarily.

According to Mayor Gerdell Voget these permits may be recalled at any time. The council is now studying the beer question from its various legal and moral angles and a regulation higher license may later be decided upon. Action of the council was unanimous, with all but one councilman being present.

E. A. McKee, recently elected city clerk to replace E. C. Erickson who resigned, was inducted into his work at this meeting.
