That quilting is not passe as far as the present generation is concerned was evident in the enthusiasm with which it greeted the showing of novel quilts at the home of Mrs. Dan J. Fry, Sr., yesterday afternoon. The exhibit, which was given for the benefit of the First Congregational church, was composed of quilts made by Mrs. Fry, her daughter, Miss Phyllis Fry, and her sister, Mrs. Kittie Graver. The collection was made up of over 20 quilts.

It is interesting to note the popularity of quilt making and to know that the women of today can quilt. Of special interest among those displayed at the Fry residence Friday afternoon was the "Lone Star" quilt, made by Mrs. Graver, which was a striking example of superb quilting, made in the brilliant, yellow and orange shades. Another of interest was one called "Rob Peter to Pay Paul," which was circular in design and blue and white in color. It was made by Mrs. Fry. Another lovely quilt made by Mrs. Fry was of the tulip design in soft pastel shades. Miss Phyllis Fry exhibited an exquisite cross-stitch pattern in pink and white satin. Unique was the cherry quilt, made of over 900 cherry blocks, a vivid study in red and white, made by Mrs. Graver. The Philadelphia Beauty, quilted by Mrs. Fry, was a brilliant design in white and yellow. The Star of the East, with yellow, blue and pink blended artfully together in the pattern, was an unusual and exceptionally attractive quilt. The ever popular double wedding ring pattern was among the quilts in the collection and several examples of colonial design were also noted.

Worthy of especial mention was the quilt made in 1830, the Double Iris Chain, which was fashioned of brilliant greens, reds, yellows, and soft blue. The piece is an heirloom in the Harbord family, of which Mrs. Fry and Mrs. Graver are members.
