

LAMP BURSTS, SETTING FIRE RAZING HOME

Woodburn—The home of Mrs. Gertrude Adams on North Fifth street was completely destroyed by fire which broke out about midnight Saturday, and Mrs. Adams was seriously injured in escaping. She had retired late after awaiting a telegram concerning the funeral arrangements of her husband, James E. Adams, who died Saturday morning at a Salem hospital.

A lamp was left burning in the room which is supposed to have exploded, causing the fire. When Mrs. Adams awakened she found herself surrounded by flames and was obliged to break a window to escape. She suffered severe burns on her arms, and badly cut hands and is thought to have internal injuries. The fire department had difficulty in reaching the scene of the fire because of the condition of the street but after some delay managed to get the small truck in action, too late to be of much service. The large truck stuck in the mud and could not be moved for more than an hour. The loss is partially covered by insurance.

This is the second Saturday night fire in Woodburn within a week, the first being the destruction of the Betsy Drew confectionery at about the same hour the previous Saturday.

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INDEPENDENCE BEER ORDINANCE HAS ATTENTION

Independence—An ordinance to permit the sale of beer and wine was introduced at the special meeting of the city council Wednesday evening and passed to its second reading without determining the fees which shall be charged for permits.

The ordinance which is subject to change, if the council so determines grants that beer and wine of not more than 3.2 alcoholic content may be served only in hotels and restaurants with meals, and that it may be sold in packages in grocery stores, drug stores, confectioneries, pool halls, cigar stores, billiard and card rooms and other places, to be taken from the places to be used. It prohibits the sale to minors, male and female, with the limit of age of such minors to be determined; provides how applications for permits shall be made; fines for violations; and various other regulations.

A number of local citizens attended the meeting and Mayor A. L. Thomas gave anyone who wished an opportunity to speak on the subject following the reading of the ordinance.

The council adjourned to meet Monday evening at 7:30 o'clock for further consideration of the ordinance, with the purpose that it may receive final consideration at the April meeting of the council the following Wednesday. A number of applicants have already filed for permits with the city recorder.
