

## BEER ORDINANCE INTEREST KEEN; RULING TAKEN

Mr. Angel—A meeting of the city council was held Monday evening in the city hall with all the members present except Fred Schwab. A communication from the city treasurer of Bay City asking for a copy of the city's beer ordinance, was read, and an application from T. P. Rohoff to manage the city beer garden was also read.

A bill for an ordinance was read, entitled "A bill for an ordinance relating to the sale of certain non-intoxicating beverages of the city of Mount Angel; providing for licenses to make such sales and the payment of license fees, therefore; providing a penalty, and declaring an emergency." This bill was read three times and upon the final reading the mayor declared that it be given permanent number 208.

The following bill was also read three times and given permanent number 207: "A bill for an ordinance to amend the charter of the city of Mt. Angel and subdivision 10, section 6, thereof, so as to permit the city of Mt. Angel to engage in the business of buying and selling non-intoxicating beverages, and, so far as may be permitted by law, intoxicating liquors; submitting the question of so amending the said charter to the qualified electors of the said city at an election called and to be held for that purpose; and providing for the calling and holding of such special election."

Street Commissioner Hassing reported that he had Magee repair and replace the pipe line from the septic tank. The marshal reported that he had the men now to work on the street, and asked for instructions regarding the work to be done. The city of Oregon to furnish about 20 feet of tile for the intersection of Taylor and Oak streets.

## VOTE ON BEER DELAYED WEEK BY COUNCILMEN

West Salem—The city council met in regular session Monday evening with all members but Lester Brannan present. Routine work was carried through.

George Chapman reported that an interview had been held with the highway department concerning the highway at Kierwood avenue.

Chapman also reported that he and Attorney Elmer Cook had been to Dallas and conferred with authorities concerning delinquent liens in West Salem. They were informed that if copies of such liens were sent to them they would be taken care of when the property was sold.

Ray J. Stumbo, chairman of the garden committee, reported more parcels of ground listed for free use than up to date had been requested.

W. M. Hamilton of the P. E. P. company was given the courtesy of the floor. He spoke of the difficulty in locating people on account of missing house numbers and street signs and asked permission to have such numbers and signs put in place at the company's expense. A resolution was adopted by the council to that effect.

The matter of changing the names of a number of streets on Cascade Drive was submitted to the street committee.

An ordinance relating to installation of oil tanks and another concerning the running at large of dogs, chickens and other animals was given first reading.

A motion prevailed that City Attorney Elmer Cook be instructed to draw up a resolution to be sent to the county court stating that West Salem wished to go on record as refusing licenses to dance halls to sell liquors from one-half of one per cent to 3.2 per cent.

A discussion of an ordinance regulating sale of beer resulted in a postponement of the matter for a week to allow more time for investigation.

The council will meet again Monday evening, April 10.

## FIRES IN TRIOS ALARM PEOPLE OF TWO SECTIONS
