

WOODBURN CITY COUNCIL WAITS TO TASTE BEER

Woodburn—A large number of spectators attended the meeting of the Woodburn city council Tuesday night hoping to hear a beer ordinance read, but were disappointed as none was forthcoming. When asked by Mayor Broyles if they had an ordinance ready one of the councilmen replied: "No, we are going to wait and sample the beer first."

Councilman Fred Miller gave a report for the street committee on the wooden sidewalks throughout the city which are in an unsatisfactory condition and on motion the report was accepted and the walkway ordered condemned and torn up. Walks included in the report are on a portion of West Lincoln street, Boyle avenue, Settlement avenue, Oak street, South Front, Bradley Brown, Wilson, Stark, Oswald, East Hayes, Blaine, Bryan and Second streets and Cupids Court.

On motion a revocable permit was given to the H. S. Gile company, which operates a jukebox on East Cleveland street, to connect to a drain along said street, under the supervision of the street commissioner. Repairs were ordered made to the pavement on South Settlement avenue.

SPRING AFFAIR FOR SILVERTON SLATED FRIDAY

Silverton—Friday promises to be one of special celebration for the Silverton merchants, townspeople and the residents of the surrounding communities. The main event is the spring opening with activities beginning at 7:30 o'clock in the evening when the decorated windows will be unveiled. These events will continue throughout Saturday, closing with a "grub" dance in the evening at the Knights of Pythias hall.

The part of the program which savors most of the unusual is being called swap day and is to be an event of Saturday afternoon. This is designated especially for the farmers and will give them an opportunity to trade articles, stock and produce, one with the other. There is to be no medium of exchange such as mere money. A vacant lot on Lewis street near First street is selected as the place where the exchanges are to be made.

The general committee in charge of arrangements is composed of Harry Larson, Lowell Hoblitt and Elmer Johnson. They have announced that there will be no local judges, but those selected from other places. Every department of business will be closed for prizes under its own head, such as groceries, meat, dry goods, etc., and will be awarded as such. A grand prize will be awarded.

The opening this year is advertised as a strictly moneyless affair. Prize awards will be ribbons only.

FARMERS REQUESTING FEDERAL FARM SEED
