SEEK PUBLICITY FOR SALARIES

Washington, April 6 (AP)—A suggestion that regulation of security issues include publicity for salaries paid officials of corporations which issue stock was made today at a senate hearing on the administration's securities control bill.

Chairman Fletcher of the senate banking and currency committee sponsored the idea.

"I am told," he said, "that the president of Paramount-Public released a \$500,000 salary. The corporation now is in receivership. Many of these companies have been wrecked, I think, by the salaries paid their officials."

R. V. Fletcher, general counsel for the association of railway executives, testified in support of his contention that railroads should not come under provisions of the bill. He said they already were fully regulated by the interstate commerce commission.

Huston Thompson, who helped draft the measure, said the bill was not burdensome on railroads and they would be bound only by the section on advertising of securities.

Alexander Holtzoff of the department of justice testified that "this bill is not any burden on, and does not constitute any interference with, legitimate business."

Fire apparently starting from a defective fuse damaged the attic portion of a two-story frame dwelling used as an apartment house and occupied by four families at 350 North Liberty a few minutes before noon Thursday. The property, owned by Don H. Upjohn, 964 South Liberty street, is fully protected by insurance.

While there was some damage to the upper portion and the roof from fire, the heaviest loss will be occasioned by water which seeped through to the first floor. Most of the belongings of the tenants were removed by volunteer workers and the remainder covered with heavy canvas to prevent damage. Water was on the blaze two minutes, by actual timing, after the alarm was turned in, water being obtained from a hydrant, a block and a half from the central fire station. The place was seen to have a chimney fire at 10 o'clock.

He promised Clark Griffith, president of the Washington club who handed him the American league passes, to attend the opening game here Wednesday between Washington and Philadelphia.

John A. Heydler, president of the National league, presented the pass for his league.

The president said baseball had done as much as any one thing to keep up the spirit of the people.

He inquired about the sale of beer in the parks. Heydler said his league would permit bars in the stands but no sales would be allowed in the seats.

PLAN TO SLASH UTILITY RATES IN WASHINGTON

Olympia, Wash., April 6 (AP)—The state department of public works today prepared to enter its program for a reduction of Washington utility rates. It was expected that formal complaints would be entered this afternoon against the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company, a subsidiary, the Home Telephone and Telegraph company of Spokane; Oregon Washington Water Service Co., of Vancouver, and the Northwestern Electric Co., of Portland, serving Vancouver, Washougal, Camas and vicinity.

According to Director E. K. Murray, the formal complaints, the first filed, the old department having undertaken only informal actions. The department is thus assured of wide powers in the rate-investigation process, by operating under the new far-reaching state laws.

Lower telephone rates in Seattle and other vital centers where the company obtains its largest revenues, will be sought through a re-evaluation of company properties, believed to be excessive by approximately \$20,000,000. Records of an informal hearing held last fall will be utilized together with new audits to be made by department examiners.

RACING BOATS MAY BE LOST

Havana, April 6 (AP)—The ketch Cynosure of St. Petersburg, Fla., and the yawl Irondequoit from Tampa, two of the 11 entries in the 300-mile yacht race from St. Petersburg to Havana, were feared lost at sea today.

The latter portion of the race, won by the schooner Hampan, was not completed through heavy winds and squalls, damaging some of the craft and causing others to shift their courses.

The coast guard cutter, Tuscarora, which accompanied the fleet, still was searching for the missing craft today and advising all vessels near Dry Tortugas to be on the lookout for them.

Gandy of St. Petersburg owned and captained the Cynosure, and G. A. Tascot of Tampa sailed the Irondequoit.

The 45-foot Haligonian, owned and sailed by Houston Hall of Tampa, repeated its 1932 victory by winning in the unlimited and class A divisions. Its time was 94 hours 53 minutes.

SECOND VICTIM OF WILD RIDE DEAD

Portland, April 6 (AP)—The second victim of a wild automobile ride early yesterday morning, died in a hospital here today. He was Wesley Hanson, 38, East Littlepage, 35, died on the way to the hospital.

Walter V. Lewis, 40, county truck driver, who was piloting the car in which the others were riding, was held on bail of \$2500 on a charge of involuntary manslaughter. Police declared he was drunk when he attempted to race another car, let his own machine get out of control and crash into a tree. Skid marks for 180 feet were found by police, they said.

LAVA BEDS REMAIN IN FOREST CONTROL

Portland, April 6 (AP)—A special dispatch to the Journal today from Washington, D. C., said: "The proposal by the Klamath Falls chamber of commerce that jurisdiction over the Lava Beds national monument in the Modoc national forest in northern California be transferred to the park service from the forest service, is negative in a letter from E. A. Sherman, acting forester, to Senator Steiwer."

The dispatch said Sherman contended that the lava beds receive about the same protection they would under the park service, and that to transfer jurisdiction would require extra personnel, as under the present arrangement the forest patrol looks after the interests of the national monument.

It is estimated about 2,000 persons last year visited the lava beds monument which marks the site of the massacre of General Canby and members of his force by the Indians.

CURLEY SELECTED FOR POLISH POST

Washington, April 6 (AP)—President Roosevelt has selected Mayor James F. Curley of Boston to be ambassador to Poland. It was learned reliably today. If approved, Curley will succeed Lamont Belin who was appointed by President Hoover but never confirmed.

SHROCK LEADS FIGHT TO PASS SALES TAX BILL

Portland, April 6 (AP)—Morton S. Shrock of Milwaukie today was elected state chairman of the executive committee of a state-wide organization which was formed here today to urge passage of the state sales tax at the July 21 election. The group met here today. L. B. Smith of Portland was named temporary executive secretary.

Only members in the first and second congressional districts were named, the others in the third district (Multnomah) being withheld until later in the day to permit the committee to obtain confirmation.

Named from the first congressional district on the executive committee were Willard Marks of Albany, former president of the state senate; Claude Ingalls of Corvallis; James E. Burdett of McMinnville; John B. Eakin, Dallas; Shrock of Milwaukie; E. C. Judd, Astoria; and Ben Morris, and Ben Chandler of Marshfield.

From the second congressional district Mac Hoke of Pendleton, R. W. Sawyer, Bend; Mrs. William Mahoney, Heppner; A. M. Collier, Klamath Falls; W. B. Snider, Paisley, and Dr. Thomas Colverth of The Dalles were chosen.

At today's meeting were Senators Corbett, Staples and Bynon, and Representatives Longman, Snedeker, Hall and Damman, all of Portland, Speaker of the House Snell of Arlington and McAlear of Hillsboro. They represented the legislative committee which is seeking to acquaint the public with the state's financial situation and explain why the sales tax is needed to keep the state on an even keel financially.

It will be the intention of the committee to organize county units to carry the fight into every county of the state. These county representatives will be named as soon as possible, it was said.

RUBY BATES DENIES ATTACK BY NEGROES

Decatur, Ala., April 6 (AP)—Shortly after the defense had rested today in the trial of Haywood Patterson, first of nine negroes accused of attacking two white women to face retrial, Ruby Bates, missing witness, appeared in the courtroom.

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CASES OF BEER SENT BY PLANE TO GOVERNORS

San Francisco, April 6 (AP)—San Francisco breweries were scenes of unusual activity today as they prepared for the midnight rush of beer delivery that will signal the return of legal brew.

Deliveries will not become general until about 6 a. m. Friday, but several clubs, hotels and cabarets planned special beer celebrations and will call for the wet goods. And the breweries will start their out-of-town shipments at exactly 12:01 a. m.

Scores of trucks were waiting to start their overnight dash to dryer parts of the state. Some of them were already loaded. They were to be given the right of way over all other traffic at the breweries.

Four trains stood loaded at the Rainier brewery. One was scheduled to reach Los Angeles in 13 hours—express train speed. The others were to head for valley cities, Portland and Seattle.

Airplanes were to carry complimentary cases to the governors of California, Oregon, Washington and Nevada. Another was to carry seven kegs to Los Angeles hotels and one to the U. S. Grant hotel in San Diego.

Local distributors were to take care of the needs of hotels and other places which planned midnight beer parties.

CUMMINGS CUTS OFF SINECURES

Washington, April 6 (AP)—Drastic curtailment of department of justice personnel to effect economies has been begun by Attorney General Cummings, with salaries totaling some \$200,000 annually said to be already whittled away.

He has been surprised by the large number of people on the payroll who serve no useful purpose, he said today, and "They will be eliminated as quickly as I can get to it. I have just set my hand to the plow and I don't intend to turn back."

More than two score employees of the department have been stricken from the rolls and Mr. Cummings said the lopping off of several hundred more would be a very conservative estimate.

Asked by newspapermen what the effect of this would be on the distribution of patronage, the attorney general replied:

"That's what's worrying the politicians."

He said the sweeping reorganization would affect every department, including the prohibition bureau.

STREET CAR BANDIT SHOT BY SOLDIERS

Portland, April 6 (AP)—J. C. Wilcutt, former soldier and qualified sharpshooter, demonstrated his expertness with an army rifle last night when he plugged a street-car bandit and shattered the man's shoulder. Dave Cameron, 21, ex-convict, was in a hospital today for treatment of the wound. Wilcutt said he saw Cameron holdup G. C. Barnett, motorman-conductor of a Mount Tabor street car. Wilcutt ran for his rifle while his wife called police. As Cameron started to run Wilcutt, in the darkness, hit him at about 150 feet.

ROOSEVELT LAUGHS AT THEATER SHOW

Washington, April 6 (AP)—President Roosevelt went to the theater last night and laughed heartily over Rachel Crother's comedy, "When Ladies Meet."

It was the first time in five years that a president has attended a regular theatrical performance.

The audience gave Mr. Roosevelt a rousing ovation as he entered his box with Mrs. Roosevelt and a White House party.

SENATE VOTES FOR 30 HOUR WEEK

Washington, April 6 (AP)—The senate today passed the Black five day week, six hour day bill after a back bench rebellion against administration plans to raise the limit to 36 hours and remove the restrictions on the number of work days per week.

The vote was 53 to 30. The bill would have tremendous social consequences. It would impose the 30 hour week on millions of Americans employed in production of goods for interstate commerce and foreign commerce originating in the United States. A similar bill is pending in the house.

RING USED FOUR TIMES

Battle Creek, Mich. (AP)—A wedding ring was used here recently for the fourth time, when Florence M. Reed, married James R. Owens. Previously, the ring had been used by the bride's grandparents, parents and her sister.

"Shades of Jason Lee," ejaculated one young man when he finally got within reading distance of a small piece of paper pinned to the board, "has this old Methodist institution had a change of heart?"

Finally showing his way through a crowd of littering students, a reporter was able to read what was pinned on the notice. It read:

"A big beer party will be held at Lausanne hall Friday night. Dr. Doney will pour, assisted by Dean Dahl."

Inquiry at the registrar's office brought out that no local hog growers had registered for the second semester and when Coach Keene came along and snatched the notice from the board, it was learned that someone had merely played an over-ripe April fool joke.

FILM PLAYERS OPPOSE CUTS

Hollywood, Cal., April 6 (AP)—Motion picture players are opposed to any general or wholesale reduction of salaries, and will fight any attempt to cut wages, according to a resolution presented to film producers today.

More than 250 actors and actresses passed the resolution at a meeting presided over by Walter Huston, their representative on the emergency board of the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences.

There had been rumors a permanent 25 per cent reduction in wages would soon be instituted to replace the eight-week cut which went into effect March 6. Reductions ranging from 25 to 50 per cent were accepted at this time but all but union workers who are now arbitrating the proposal.

Sidney R. Kent, president of Fox Films, was here from the east to confer with studio heads. He declared his purpose was to effect a reduction in wages. Many other high executives are expected here within the next few days.

SEVEN SACRIFICED BEFORE CLAY IDOL

Villupuram, Madras, India, April 6 (AP)—Police said today that they had discovered evidence of the sacrifice of seven human lives before the clay idol of an elephant here.

The victims were a man and his wife and their five children. About the bodies were broken coconuts and other offerings. There was evidence that all the victims had consented to the sacrifice. Police believed the father killed the others, then committed suicide. Poverty was believed to be behind the tragedy.

ROOSEVELT INVITES FRENCH PREMIER

Washington, April 6 (AP)—The United States, it was learned authoritatively today, has told the French government informally that it will be glad to receive Premier Deladier or a delegation to discuss general economic subjects and disarmament.

Depending on reaction to this suggestion, an official invitation to Deladier, similar to that issued to Prime Minister Macdonald of Great Britain, may be extended within 24 hours.

16TH ANNIVERSARY OF WAR ENTRANCE

Washington, April 6 (AP)—President and Mrs. Roosevelt joined today in the observance of the 16th anniversary of the entrance of the United States into the World war. Army day exercises were centered in a military pageant which marched from the capitol to the Washington monument where 82 units were reviewed.

ALTURAS TRAINS TO BE SUSPENDED

Passenger trains Nos. 22 and 23 running tri-weekly between Klamath Falls and Alturas will be suspended after April 16, the Southern Pacific company today informed the public utilities commission.

A change in schedules of trains between Lakeview and Alturas, California, it was declared, would take care of the freight business, while insufficient passenger business made the suspension necessary otherwise, it was stated.
