

SEVEN GRANTED BEER LICENSES FOR SILVERTON

Silverton—The Silverton city council held a special meeting Thursday night in the city hall to select a new member of the council and to consider several last-day license applications to sell beer.

C. A. Hande, Sr., prominent merchant, was chosen as the councilman to succeed J. F. Conrad who handed in his resignation several weeks ago when he and members of his family left for an extended stay in Arizona. Mayor E. W. Garver made the appointment and the other members voted unanimous approval of the choice.

According to the number of licenses issued by the council permitting the sale of beer with a 3.2 per cent alcoholic content, there will be seven places legalized where the beverage may be obtained as early as just after midnight Friday. However, discussion as to when the sale would begin seemed to designate that George Manolis should be the first to serve the drink at 8 o'clock in the morning.

Four permits were approved last night, and included the following: George Manolis, with privilege of selling in original containers and also at tables in his place of business; Berger Penelope, both methods of sale; Harry B. Craig, reported to have arranged to open the former confectionery and lunch room known as "The Cozy," will dispense both at tables and in original containers; and H. D. Long, to sell only in original containers.

Permits granted at the regular session Monday night were given George Steelhammer, drugstore, to sell in original containers, and both pool halls, Mac's Place of which Arthur Heater is proprietor, and the Club Pool hall, John Rude, proprietor, were permitted to sell both in containers and in their places of business.

The judiciary committee of the council and the city recorder are legally empowered to regulate and promulgate any rules necessary to control the situation as to orderliness, cases of minors, restrictions concerning minors, booths or any other effect to make serving of beer a secret affair. The ordinance makes ample provision for this possibility. Current opinion is that a number of other firms will soon apply for license for selling in the original container after July, as the license granted now are the same price per part as for the entire semi-annual license.

DALLAS STORES GET LICENSES; DEMAND SLIGHT

Dallas—At a special meeting of the city council Wednesday night four licenses were granted to applicants under the provisions of the recently enacted beer ordinance. F. E. Kersey was the only restaurant dealer whose application went through, his license permitting him to sell beer by the glass with or without meals.

Those in this class denied at the special session were the Gail hotel, the Blue Garden and the Pauline cafe. Licenses granted to retailers to sell by the bottle include E. A. Nusom. Licenses issued at this time are for a six months' period.

Inquiries directed at the four merchants who will dispense beer in this city revealed that little business was likely to be transacted on account of non-delivery. One of the stores stated that they expected to be able to meet demands Monday with western beer from Portland or Tacoma but did not expect to handle the eastern product before the 15th. Two of the remaining three frankly stated that they could not set a date when they would be able to supply it. F. E. Kersey was in Salem Thursday afternoon negotiating in an effort to meet any request for the beverage Friday.
