Townfolk Anticipate Light Opera Club's "Bohemian Girl"

The university set and townfolk as well are marking Monday and Tuesday evenings in their date books as the time when they will see "The Bohemian Girl", which is being presented at the Capitol theater. Last minute details are engaging the major time of the cast and the technical staff just now, with dress rehearsal being held at the theater on Saturday morning. Interest centers around Arline, the heroine of the opera as portrayed by Miss Elizabeth Clement. Outstanding among the many hits of "The Golden Trail" as produced by the Light Opera club last season was Miss Clement's performance as Barbara. Possessing a high, lyric soprano voice, the selection of her as the Bohemian girl could have hardly been better chosen. She is a senior student in the school of music at the university.

Playing opposite Miss Clement is Robert Mayne, an exiled Polish noble. Mr. Mayne, while a newcomer to the campus, has appeared in many major productions in the south. Two years ago he played the leading role in "El Bandido", another Light Opera club production.

Outstanding among the other vocalists who have leading roles in the opera is Miss Bernice Rickman as queen of the gypsies. Miss Rickman was recently elected Queen of May at Willamette and is known throughout the city for her excellent voice. Maurice Dean as the Count Arnhelm has been selected to sing such arias as "The Heart Bow'd Down", "The Soldiers' Life", and others because of his phenomenal baritone voice. Salem folk will appreciate the opportunity to hear Mr. Dean again in the role of Count Arnhelm, the jovial, roguish, fastidious nephew of Count Arnhelm, completes the list of principals. Mr. Barber is well known among Salem folk for his dramatic ability and now he attempts the difficult role of Florestin to prove his singing ability also.

Costumes, properties and sets are all in readiness for the opening night Monday. Specially imported costumes, scenes designed and executed for this production alone and other items have taken a major portion of time in the planning for "The Bohemian Girl". In one scene alone, over 60 people are on the stage at one time, with noblemen, gypsies, peasants, ladies-in-waiting, soldiers, clowns, costumes clashing in a riot of color against the vivid background of a street fair in the 17th century.

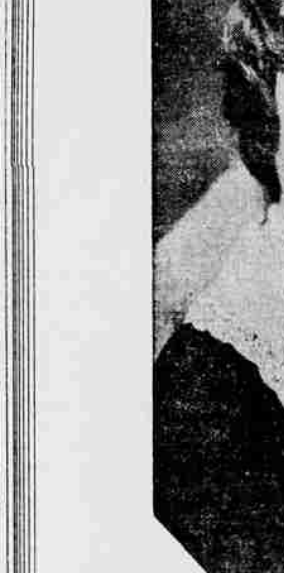
