

INDEPENDENCE FIREMEN HELD AS 'FIRE BUGS'

Independence—Three local men are "in bad" for starting fires which destroyed property belonging to Mrs. D. D. Good of this city, and the Basque estate. George Arrell, a former member of the fire department, has confessed to partial responsibility for the fires which destroyed the barn belonging to Mrs. Good and the small house on F street adjoining the Sorg property, belonging to the Basque estate, in 1930 and 1931. He implicated "Cy" Craber, another member of the department, in the barn fire and Harold Sorg in the Basque fire.

According to Arrell's statement he helped to fire the buildings to get the \$2 fee which is paid firemen by the city of Independence. He induced the other two men to assist him for like reasons as they would receive the same compensation. All have made confessions and will receive their sentences at the hands of Judge Walker the first of the week.

Sorg was not a member of the department at the time of the firing but claimed to have done the job to get rid of an unsightly building where tramps stayed and wild parties were held. Sorg has been spending the winter in Oregon City but formerly lived in this city. Arrell was dropped from the fire department rolls sometime ago, but Craber is still a member and assistant chief at this time.

Arrell was first implicated by Ed Neil, 34, who was sentenced to three years in the penitentiary last week, after pleading guilty to a charge of arson, involving a dwelling house on the T. J. Primus ranch, Esie Hickman, 29, with whom he was living at the time of the fire, was also convicted and sentenced to one year.

It was through some misunderstandings the two men had over the woman in the case that connected Arrell up with setting fires. Neil revealed the activity of Arrell as a fire starter, and then George to retaliate gave information to city police and state police officers which led to the uncovering of the entire plot. Subsequently he named his two assistants, Craber and Sorg, and then later admitted their responsibility.

Arrell and Sorg are single men with no dependents while Craber has a wife and a child. His mother and a sister and two brothers also live in Independence.

EDUCATORS TO HOLD MEETING

SHERIDAN BEERLESS ON OPENING DATE

Sheridan—Friday in Sheridan was beerless, as the council has yet taken no final action on the matter. But a liberal policy has been decided upon and any responsible person may obtain a city license according to instruction given to the city attorney in drawing up the ordinance by the council.

A fee of \$5 per quarter for bottled beer and \$12.50 per quarter for draught beer with a cash bond in each case of \$100 was decided upon. The bond as well as the fee will be forfeited instantly upon any violation of law, either in permitting the premises to become a nuisance or in the sale of beer to persons not authorized to buy.

At the county seat the McMinnville council met the day after the Sheridan meeting and tabled the matter until July. This action followed a fiery discussion for two weeks, in which the churches united in opposing the proposed measure, which would have provided for licensed beer parlors.

BULK BEER BAN VOTED AT SCIO BY COUNCILMEN

Scio, Ore.—Sale of beer of alcoholic content exceeding 2 percent, except in original packages, is prohibited in Scio by an ordinance adopted at the April meeting of the city council. The vote on the ordinance was unanimous, all six members of the council voting in the affirmative.

Under apparent misapprehension of the actual meaning of the ordinance as to the content of the beverage to be sanctioned, there was some sentiment in favor of the local status, 3.2 percent alcoholic content, but this was thrashed out apparently to the satisfaction of all members.

The ordinance prohibits the drinking of beer on the premises of the vendor or to give any beverage containing more than 2 percent alcoholic content to any person under 18 years of age or give it away within 400 feet of any school house. The city will collect \$25 fine while a penalty of not less than \$20 nor more than \$100 is provided for violations of the ordinance, not less than ten nor more than 50 days in jail, or both fine and imprisonment. The ordinance became effective upon passage and the signature of Mayor W. A. Ewing.

It will appear in 25 cent, 50 cent and one dollar denominations.
