

SCIO FACING ACTION UPON WATER SUPPLY

Scio—A saving of approximately \$150 a year will be effected by action of the Scio town council at the April meeting in curtailing electric light expenses. Upon recommendation of A. L. Plummer, chairman of the appropriate committee, 700 kilowatts were eliminated from the city lighting bill. The Mountain States Power company, which supplies the current, readily acquiesced in the economy program inaugurated by the Scio town council at the beginning of the present calendar year.

A letter from the Oregon Insurance rating bureau, which was read to the council, indicated that before material reductions in insurance rates here could be made it would be necessary for the council to choose between two alternatives—either provide a 50,000-gallon reserve tank for the city water system, or supply an adequate static pressure and water supply for fire purposes in some other manner. The council indicated that neither alternative could be seriously considered at this time on account of expense involved.

Chairman Plummer stated that no additional proposals had been received by the committee in connection with the proposed construction of a new 6000-gallon metal tank to replace the present cinder tank, and the matter was passed until the May meeting of the council, which is to convene May 4.

A city dog tax was discussed briefly, but no definite action was taken. It was stated that the city charter empowers the council to levy an annual tax on dogs kept within the city.

Mayor W. A. Ewing informed the council that the city treasurer had been in communication with holders of city bonds with a view of refunding in accordance with a movement started at the March meeting of the council, but that no definite reply had been received. The matter still is under consideration and is to have further action at future meetings.

The committee on streets and public property was instructed to take up with G. L. Flanagan, Sr., his application for the use of the city property formerly occupied by the Mumper family.

Fred Roundmire of the street committee stated that the principal of the Scio high school had proposed to move the city jail building a short distance east of its present location, in order to provide more space for the new practice baseball diamond near the school building. The work is to be done without cost to the city, which sanctioned the move.

The town marshal was instructed to post notices prohibiting dumping of trash and refuse within the city limits, and especially at the old ford on Thomas creek a short distance east of the Bliven garage.

Scotts Mills Will Cut Teachers' Pay
Scotts Mills—The teachers from the school have all been reelected with the exception of Miss Elsie Nagini, the commercial teacher, who sent her resignation to the board earlier in the year. Miss Nagini is teaching the third year. Miss Nagini is reelected as Mrs. Bethel Taylor, principal, teaching her seventh year; Harold Wynd, mathematics and coach, first year; Miss Ruth Boyce, advanced grades, second year; Miss Irene Athey, intermediate grades, first year; and Mrs. LeRoy Frazier, primary, first year. There is an understanding there will be a cut in salaries.
