

BIRD HOUSES ARE DISPLAYED TO CIVIC CLUB

Monmouth—There is no doubt as to the success of the bird house exhibit sponsored by the Monmouth Civic club and made possible by the generosity of the merchants of Monmouth in contributing prizes and by the willing cooperation and generous assistance of Mr. Alfred T. Allen, instructor of the Monmouth high school manual training department. Interested persons who viewed the 72 entries comprising the exhibit were surprised at the fine workmanship, the originality, and the great variety of design displayed. As one of the judges remarked, "much of the work is beyond amateur class, and judging is no easy task."

Thirty-eight students, three of whom were girls, from the Monmouth grade and high schools took part in the exhibit. In order that the younger entrants might not have to compete with older and more experienced entrants three divisions were made, namely: Junior, which included all entries from students below the seventh grade, intermediate, which included all entries from students in the seventh and eighth grades, and senior which included all entries from students in the high school. Aside from the entry prize received by each exhibitor, some 30 prizes were awarded.

Winners of prizes in the senior division were Richard Snider, first prize, and two special prizes, one of which was for the best workmanship exhibited; Louis Rutschman, second prize and a special prize for the best originality in design; Harold McKern, third prize and a special prize for the best color adaptation; Harold McKern, fourth prize; Curtis Hall, fifth prize; Louis Rutschman, sixth prize; Harold McKern, seventh prize; Thelma Amort, eighth; Curtis Hall, ninth; Kenneth Hinkle, 10th; and Raymond Johnson, 11th. Russell Sheon won a special prize for exhibiting the most unique novelty. In the intermediate division, Donald Smith won first and a special prize; Carl Bond, second; Wayne Petrie, third; Maurice Smith, fourth; Walter McKern, fifth; and LeRoy Weaver, sixth. Donald Smith won first prize in the junior division and also a special prize, and Georgia Print took second and Norman Flint third. Of the three special girls' prizes awarded Miss Thelma Amort won the first and third and Miss Berline Derby won the second. The judges were Mrs. Howard Morlan, Mrs. J. S. Landers, Miss Alabama Breunton, Mr. James Tilton, Mr. C. M. Price and Mr. Forest Chambers.

Mrs. Forest E. Chambers, as chairman of the Civic club committee in charge of the exhibit, is directly responsible for its success. The selection of a suitable display room, the artistic arrangement of a background for the bird houses, the placement of the various exhibits so that they might show to best advantage, the securing of qualified judges and the numerous other details connected with such an undertaking were in her care. Those who saw the display were unanimous in expressing the opinion that it was the best they had ever seen. A three-fold decorating scheme was used by Mrs. Chambers, the forest idea being carried out in the foreground with the use of evergreens, moss and logs; the orchard idea being carried out in the central section with arrangement of budding cherry bows; and the garden idea being the theme in the background and made quite realistic by the use of garden furniture, vine maple and banked spruces bordered with daffodils. Assisting her were the boys of the manual training classes, Miss Thelma Amort and Mr. Alfred T. Allen.
