

POLK BOUNDARY BOARD RULINGS ARE DESIGNATED

Dallas—In compliance with a law enacted by the last state legislature the Polk county district boundary board has divided the territory of Polk county, not situated in a high school district, in five zones as follows:

Northeast zone No. 1, consisting of the following grade school districts: Zena No. 1, Brush College No. 31, West Salem No. 32, Spring Valley No. 35, Popcorn No. 36, Lincoln No. 40 and Mountain View No. 61.

Southeast zone No. 2, consisting of the following grade school districts: Parker No. 11, Valley View No. 12, Fairview No. 22, Elkins No. 28, Buena Vista No. 33, Suver No. 43, Hopville No. 63 and Highland No. 64.

Southwest zone No. 3, consisting of the following grade school districts: Bridgeport No. 7, Lewisville No. 8, Cochrane No. 24, Antioch No. 30, Montgomery No. 39, Mc-Timmonds Valley No. 46, Sunny Slope No. 49, Oakdale No. 51, Guthrie No. 54, Black Rock No. 55, Liberty No. 56, Oakhurst No. 60, Mistletoe No. 67 and Wildwood No. 68.

Northwest zone No. 4, consisting of the following grade school districts: Red Prairie No. 6, Salt Creek No. 10, Scroggins No. 14, Orchards No. 15, Gooseneck No. 23, Gold Creek No. 25, Buell No. 34, Harmony No. 37, Upper Salt Creek No. 38, Enterprise No. 42, Mill Creek No. 65, Valley Junction No. 69 and Fern No. 71. Central zone No. 5, consisting of the following grade school districts: Smithfield No. 3, Eola No. 4, Polk Station No. 18, Oak Grove No. 19, Oak Point No. 27, North Dallas No. 41, Yampo No. 45, Greenwood No. 7, McCoy No. 53, Pioneer No. 58 and Orchard View No. 72.

The law requires that all the ter-

ritory not situated in a high school district be organized in a non-high school district for the purpose of levying a tax to pay the cost of tuition (and, or) transportation of high school pupils from non-high school districts to high schools.

The law also creates a board of directors, consisting of five members, with power to make contracts with high school districts for tuition (and, or) transportation of the high school students who live in the non-high school territory. One member of the board will be elected from each zone. The vote will be at large and the candidate, residing in each zone, receiving the largest vote shall be declared elected.

The nomination and election will be administered as follows: Nominations shall be by petitions, copies of which can be secured from Josiah Wills, county school superintendent of Polk county. The petitions must be filed with the county school superintendent at least 15 days prior to the election and must be signed by at least thirty legal voters of the zone in which the candidate is a resident. (The candidate shall be a taxpayer). The election will be held on the third Monday in June, 1933, in conjunction with the annual school election. The polling places will be in each grade school district with the board of directors acting as the election board. After the election is held the chairman shall seal and mail the ballots and tally sheet to the county school superintendent. The Polk county district boundary board will then canvass the ballots and declare who are elected members of the board.

SAFETY WORK SAVES YOUTHS FROM TRAGEDY

Safety education in the public schools and elsewhere is saving the lives of 3,000 children annually!

That's the report Secretary of State Hal Hoss received from the national conference on street and highway safety.

Not only are children more easily adapting themselves to modern traffic conditions than are other classes and group population, but the increase in the number of traffic deaths is showing the smallest gain among juveniles, the report shows.

Safety education among children, especially in the schools and including the work of schoolboy patrols, of which Oregon has many outstanding examples, is credited with the favorable showing.

"The increase of child fatalities from motor vehicle accidents has been less than that of adult fatalities from the same cause," said the report. "In a 7-year period, motor vehicle accidents increased 82.2 per cent but deaths among children under 15 years of age increased only 22.9 per cent, while fatalities among persons over 15 increased 166.9 per cent."

"Safety campaigns conducted in

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various cities and states with the design of reducing the injury rate among children are found to have definitely proved their value. In many cities, the campaigns have included organization of school safety patrols. There were 10,000 patrols in existence in 800 cities, towns and villages in the last year, composed of 175,000 boys guiding 2,500,000 children across streets."

LEGIONNAIRES TALK SCOUT ACTIVITIES

Stanton—Stanton Post No. 58 of the American Legion held its monthly meeting in the new quarters of the Boys Scouts in the basement of the community club building. The post is sponsoring the Scouts this year and quarters were completed with the aid of funds donated by the public, most of the work being done by the committee which consists of legionnaires and non-legionnaires.

The matter of carrying on the junior baseball program for the season was discussed, and plans were made for raising the necessary funds.

An indoor shooting match was arranged by the entertainment committee headed by Sim F. Elzel and was enjoyed by the members, most of whom found themselves much out of practice.

TICK MENACE IS SEEN AGAIN

With three cases of spotted fever appearing in Baker, Gilliam and Wheeler counties, the annual tick menace is again showing itself in eastern Oregon, the state health board reports.

Spotted fever, which frequently proves fatal, is caused by the bites of certain sage ticks. The season lasts for about three and a half months, usually from about March 15 to July 1. The activity of the insects is governed by temperature and moisture.

Persons likely to encounter ticks are advised to wear high-topped shoes, with trouser legs tucked in. Careful examination for the insects should be made upon return from possible exposure. Particular attention should be given the hair, where ticks are least easily detected. A biting tick may be made to desist by applying turpentine, benzine, iodine or denatured alcohol.

Other diseases reported in the state for the last week by the health experts include 72 measles, 24 pneumonia, 25 chicken pox, 31 influenza, 21 scarlet fever, 15 whooping cough, 12 tuberculosis, 16 smallpox, 2 typhoid, 2 mumps, 3 erysipelas, and 1 diphtheria.

Germans Bar Jews From Sports Games

Berlin, April 13 (AP)—Further restrictions against Jews in Germany went into operation today when the football federation voted to bar Jews from international matches and the track and field sports federation took similar action in its sphere.

The national federation of the German press, comprising practically all Germans engaged in journalism, also voted to eliminate Jews, approving the dictum of the new Nazi chairman that the days of nonpartisan newspapermen's organizations are over.
