

REPORT SHOWS TEN BIG SPANS DURING YEAR

Ten new bridges of major importance were constructed during the past year on Oregon highways, the state highway commission reports.

Seven of these are on the Oregon coast highway, two on the Umpqua highway, and one on The Dalles-California.

The bridge across the mouth of the Rogue river at Gold Beach, 1,938 feet long, is one of the longest in the northwest. It was dedicated to the late Governor I. L. Patterson.

All of the new bridges are concrete or concrete and steel.

Those on the coast highway are: Juno overcrossing, 180 feet; Wilson river, 180 feet; Ten Mile creek, 150 feet; Rock creek, 200 feet; Big creek, 225 feet; Cape creek, 608 feet; and the Rogue river crossing.

Other new constructions are the Klamath Falls overcrossing on The Dalles-California highway, and the bridges across Weatherly creek, 154 feet; and Elk creek, 140 feet, on the Umpqua highway.

A new bridge across the Santiam at Jefferson on the east-side Pacific highway is now nearing completion.

The highway commission states that within the next two or three years, a number of other important bridges must be built in the state, replacing existing structures.

Among these are three bridges across the South Umpqua between Roseburg and Myrtle creek; one across the Calapooya river on the east-side Pacific highway in Linn county; Spanish Gulch, on the upper Columbia highway; South Yamhill, on the west-side Pacific highway; North Fork of Nehalem on the Oregon coast highway; and the Little Nestucca, on the same road.

Slender, stony-eyed young woman, with blond-gold hair, is not the conventional idea of a description for a successful writer of adventure and mystery thrillers, but it fits Mignon G. Eberhart. Her latest story, "The White Cockatoo," will appear serially in the Capital Journal beginning Saturday, April 15.

Mrs. Eberhart (her husband is a civil engineer) has the unique distinction of having sold every story she ever wrote. Her first novelette was hidden, unseen and unread, for two years before she gathered enough courage to submit it to a publisher. It was accepted immediately, to be followed by half a dozen stories and novels.

A native of Lincoln, Neb., Mrs. Eberhart is the daughter of W. T. Good. Three years at Nebraska Wesleyan university were followed by a special library course, then marriage.

Although her novels are distinguished for masterful suspense and vivid, exciting action, Mrs. Eberhart insists on maintaining a respectful distance from everything but the calm and placid life, Pistols are familiar weapons in the hands of her characters, but a paper bag exploded behind the author produces a realistic hop, step and jump from the scene.

Their home now nominally in Chicago, the Eberharts are almost constantly "on the move" to meet the nomadic demands of the engineering profession. But whether she is at her apartment or in a construction camp Mrs. Eberhart writes.
