

WOODBURN WILL ERECT NEW CATHOLIC CHURCH

CONSTRUCTION WORK TO START AT EARLY DATE

Woodburn—Plans for the construction of the new St. Luke's Catholic church on the site of the old building on Harrison near the corner of Third street were announced here today by Rev. J. E. Rubis, pastor. Bidding for the old building will start Monday under the direction of Oscar Jensen, local contractor, and the new foundation will be laid in about two weeks.

The new edifice, which was designed by C. W. Jackson, Portland architect, will be of Roman architecture and one of the most beautiful in the state. The seating capacity will be 800. The building will be 137 feet in length and 50 feet in width, except at the transepts, each of which will be 14 feet, making that part 78 feet in width. A beautifully designed colored glass rose window, measuring 8 1/2 feet across, will be placed in the middle of the front wall and above the main door. The window is being given by Mr. and Mrs. N. Serres of East Woodburn. Harmonizing in color and design with the rose window, will be 24 other stained glass windows, images on which will be life size. The cost will be approximately \$400 for the large window and \$4000 for the small collectively. Most of these are being donated by members of the parish.

The walls will be constructed of hollow tile with brick exterior, which will present a mottled red and black effect. Across the front and around the east corner will be a terrace of hard brick with an iron railing. Modern methods will be used to drain the terrace, thereby preventing its disintegration. Art Alton and Company of Portland will be in charge of the brick work and materials will come from the Columbia Brick company. The roof will be all copper, the largest and only roof of its type in the state. Strong support trusses of the latest type and adapted from those used by the modern German architects will be used. Four crosses will be on the outside of the building: one on the south or front, one on the west and two on the east side. The bell tower will also be on the front. The tolling apparatus of the bell and the bell will rest on iron arms that are thrust directly from the walls of the tower.

The main auditorium, which was personally designed by Father Rubis, will have three aisles running directly from altar to doors opening into the vestibule, which will measure 14 to 18 feet. A combined choir loft and rear balcony will be immediately above the vestibule and connected by a winding staircase to the main floor. There will be two more balconies nearer the front of the auditorium, and in the upper part of the transepts. The features will include two double sound boxes on the east end, each under the north end of a balcony in the transepts, and a quiet room enclosed in glass at the rear of the auditorium on the east side for the convenience of mothers with children. Pillars will not be used in the auditorium and the floor will slope forward, being two feet higher in the rear than in the front, to allow full vision from any point. The ceiling will be 28 to 30 feet above the floor. Five exits, equipped with safety doors, will allow the church, though filled to capacity, to be emptied in a few minutes in case of emergency.

The latest type of ventilation and heating, electrically controlled from the vestry, will be employed with the use of a system of fans. War air from the furnace will pass through the large pipe up to a point near the ceiling at the front of the auditorium and the cold air will be removed from the room through a pipe near the floor that draws it away from the rear. The fans assure the rapid passage of air and will be reversed in summer to cool the room.

The altars and 14 stations of the cross will be saved from the present building for use in the new structure. The figure of Our Lord, which will be placed at the front of the auditorium, following which the tearing down of the building will start. Until the new church is completed, Sunday masses will be held in the St. Luke's community hall and week-day masses in the chapel of St. Benedict's school.
