WOODBURN BOY GIVEN HONORS AT STATE MEET

Woodburn—Lyman Seeley, junior, Woodburn high school, was one of the nine members of the Future Farmers of America awarded the degree of State Farmer at the state convention at Oregon State college last week. Boys awarded this honor are selected on a basis of outstanding home project work, grades and activities in their high schools and local Future Farmer organizations. His project at the present time consists of three purebred brood sows, and 24 acres of crops. He was president of the local chapter last year, and has been active in student body affairs.

The Woodburn F.F.A. chapter was one of the four chapters in the state to be designated a keystone chapter. To receive this distinction a chapter must complete 90 percent of projects started, have a paid-up membership of 85 percent of all boys taking agriculture, sponsor a father and son banquet and analyze the project records for at least two different enterprises. The other schools receiving this rating were Union, Newberg and Gresham.

Other members from Woodburn attending the state convention were Hubert Seeley, Gordon Seeley, Leo Haller, Frank Barrios, Eddon Brandt and Robert Stauffer. The program which started Thursday evening and ended Saturday consisted of the annual business session, a tour of the campus, an F.F.A. officers training school, the finals of the statewide oratorical contest, and a number of vocational contests and demonstrations. The latter consisted of demonstrations of farm shop work, sewing, seed corn, and grading potatoes, and contests in grain judging, livestock evaluation, farm accounting and grafting and budding. Robert Stauffer and Hubert Seeley took third place in the seed corn selection demonstration.

Officers for the state association were elected for the year. Lyman Seeley was elected state reporter.
