LEBANON OFFICIAL IS HELD IN JAIL

Albany—C. I. Leavengood, former justice of the peace at Lebanon, on a secret indictment returned by the Tinn county grand jury yesterday was arrested on a charge of embezzling \$1,098 of the funds of the Masonic Cemetery association, an adjunct of the Masonic lodge No. 44, A. F. & A. M. of Lebanon.

Leavengood was brought to Albany on a bench warrant issued by Judge L. H. McMahan. Bond was fixed at \$1500. The defendant was unable to raise the money and was placed in the county jail. Bond was reduced yesterday to \$1000. Upon arraignment Leavengood entered a plea of not guilty. Trial of the case was set for the September term of circuit court.

Leavengood has been an officer of the Masonic Cemetery association at Lebanon for many years, during which he has had charge of collecting the association's income.
