The program scheduled is as follows:

From 9:30 to 10:30 o'clock in the high school auditorium, the 4-H club "Stitch and Chatter" first and second division sewing, will present an achievement day program, with demonstrations and club activities. Summit Hill 4-H club will point the local club in the exercises and display booths. The first aid class, Boy Scouts of Turner troop No. 17 will give a demonstration and the awarding of certificates will ensue.

Beginning at 10:30 o'clock at the tabernacle grounds a track meet and tug-of-war will be featured, concluding the festivities until the afternoon session. From 12 to 1 o'clock a basket dinner will be served, everybody to bring a basket and table service. Paper plates and coffee will be furnished free. Beginning at 1 and continuing until 3 o'clock the health parade and judging of health floats will take place, with floats entered from the rural district schools, Cloverdale, Summit Hill, Crawford, Battle Creek, and one from each room in the Turner grade school. Judges will be chosen so as to represent each district.

The crowning of the queen, Audrey Shoen, high school senior, as Queen Audrey I, will be followed by the May dances, merry singing and other features.
